

Emergency Planning Sets Evacuation Routes

Main routes to the north-west to be used by residents of Halton County in voluntary evacuation in case of emergency have been chosen, according to a report from Police Chief F. W. Oliver of Oakville to the regular meeting of the Emergency Planning Committee of Halton County. Chief Oliver serves as police director in the county's Emergency Measures Planning Committee.

Committee members learned that plans would be completed shortly regarding routes from various locations to the main evacuation highways. It was decided to invite representatives of the counties of Wellington and Westmorland and the city of Hamilton to meet to complete a traffic plan for the larger area.

Ray F. Smith, county engineer, requested limits on bridges had been recorded for main routes and that further studies

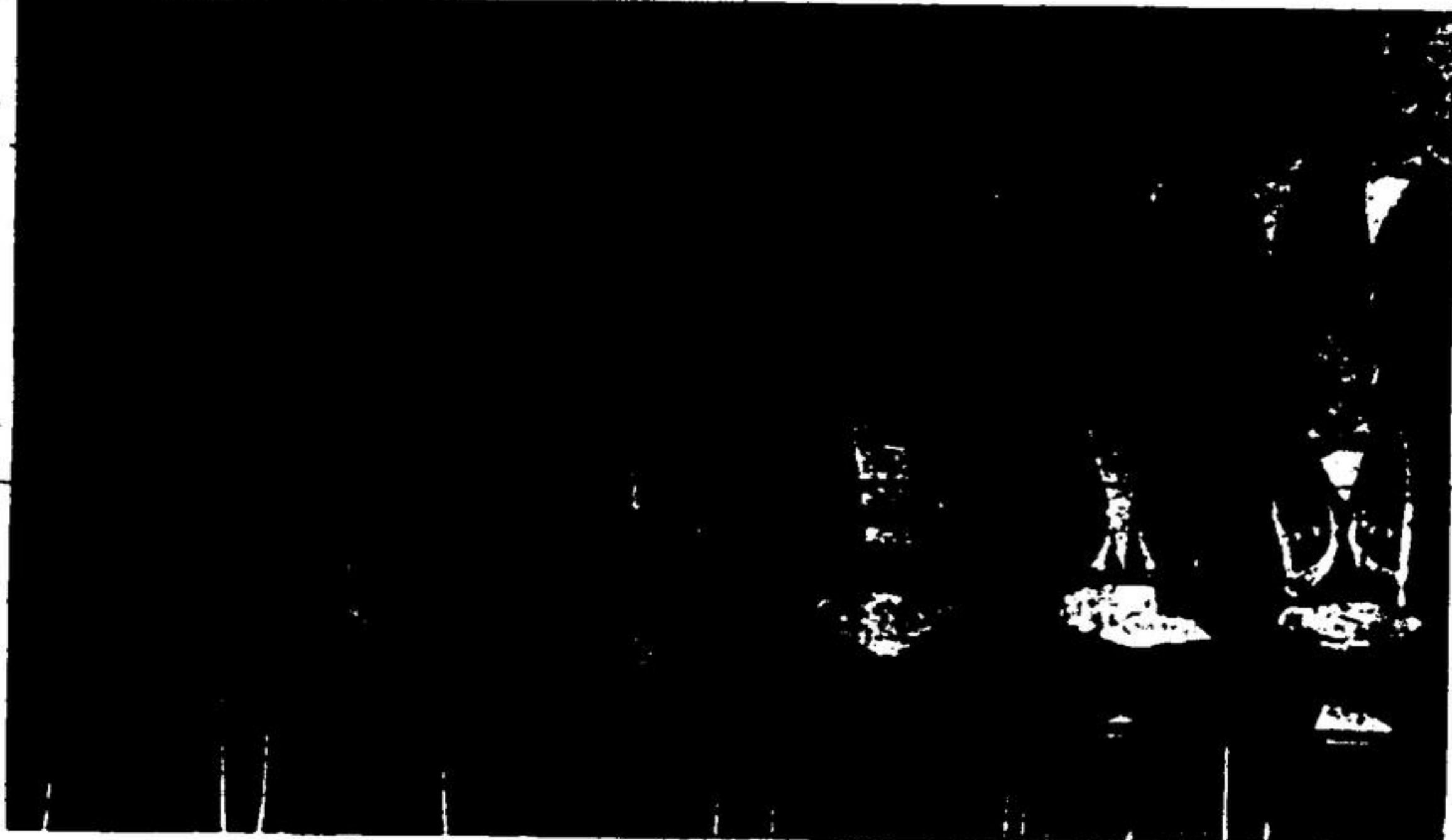
of road limits on alternate routes were under way.

Bruce McGee, county coordinator, appealed for residents to take courses in home nursing, first aid, communication, rescue work and welfare. He said that any group wishing information on courses in these subjects should contact Halton EMO, Box 143, Milton, or call 278-2801. Yalls and films would also be provided.

Garfield Brown, committee chairman, presided. Others attending were J. D. Gray, well-

fare director; Dr. A. Y. Bell, medical officer of health; J. Ford Rogers, county assessor, and J. C. Andrew, deputy county clerk.
