Halt Farmers at Safety Council

Farm Safety Programs were stressed at the Annual Zone Conference of the Ontario Farm Safety Council held in Galt, on Tuesday, October 30. The Halton Farm Safety Council, representing farm organizations in Halton, took part in the conference program. Johnstone Neelands, Halton Chairman of the Halton Farm Safety Council, was a panel member discussing the subject of "Farm Safety Promotion". In his presentation he stressed the promotion of First Aid Courses, Highway Safety, and the use of farm vehicle Safety Flags.

Delegates were present from 9 of the counties in this immediate area. Speakers for the Conference included H. E. Bell, Secretary of the Ontario Farm Safety Council, and H. Wright, Farm Safety Specialist with the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Mr. Bell and Mr. Wright outlined their remarks to the theme of the Conference, County Farm Safety Programs.

Houses, Apartment Swell Building Total

During September, building permits valued at \$211,525 were issued here in town. These permits were all for dwellings or garages. However, during October, the total dropped to \$113,450. This too, represented residential development. \$77,000 of this total was a permit for an apartment building.

Resident Critical of EMO Organization

Town resident Robert Letts criticized Halton's Emergency Measures Organization when he spoke to council on November 6th. Council had heard county coordinator Bruce McGregor outline the EMO setup at a Council meeting. But according to Mr. Letts, the speech told him nothing.

He raised a barrage of questions on the topic of emergency shelters. He said that the town could cope with an emergency shelter, but that under the current EMO, there are no shelters available. He said that the only shelter available is a 30 room room under the municipal building, which is being done about food and water supplies.

Mayor Sargent told him it would be impossible to answer such involved and complex questions on the spot. Mr. Letts demanded, and that general plans are being formulated and will be revealed as they progress.

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Planning Accurate Surveys of Town

A judge's plan ordered some time ago by the Ontario government will have an eventual cost to Georgetown of \$34,500, according to figures presented to council on November 6th by land surveyor William Carr. It is designed to provide accurate surveys in older sections of town where no detailed subdivision plans exist.

Burden of the Stage plan will not fall in any one year, Mayor Sargent explained to council. The first stage, planned for next year, is estimated to cost \$3500.
