Before the season got underway, a meeting of the clubs and the games committee was held and they adopted a set of rules to govern play for the year. Copies of the local rules were included in the schedules of the teams to play in this draw. Some of these rules are as follows:

If a team member is absent on any team, the team members must move up one position only. A full team must be read unless cleared by the Games committee.

If two members of a team are absent for a game, the game is forfeit, except absence with good cause, then at the discretion of the Games committee, the game may be played or forfeited. When the game is cleared with the Games committee for play, with two players absent, the team members present will each move up one position only. Spares may fill in the vacant positions. Skips may fill in as spares only if no other players are available and must play lead.

Spares are to be drawn from the bulletin board roster of spares whenever possible (Try and get one to fill in for a game).

All members must notify their skips in advance if they are to be unable to attend a game. Skips must notify their skips if they will be absent.

These are some of the local club rules that govern play at North Halton. Others will be published from time to time. In the meantime, better get a copy and read them over, so that there will be no misunderstanding when a ruling goes against your team.

Competition will soon be starting in the club ladder play so that top teams can practice and when competing in outside bonspiels give a good account of themselves. Better check with the Games Committee, headed by Bob Costley, if you would like to participate in the ladder competition.

The ladies section have started their regular schedule and we hope to have some results for you before many days, on the standing.

When out at the club Sunday afternoon getting the game results, noticed three golfers crossing to the ninth green. The golfers sure make use of the course as long as possible, but when the course is there why not make use of it?

## Morale - Don't Leave Before the Game's Over Raider Rally Swamps Sailors

Intermediate hockey fans who walked out of Georgetown arena Friday night after forty five minutes of frustration are going about beating themselves about the cranium with tightly clenched fists this week.

Not that they weren't justified in assuming the final twenty minutes would have been radically different from what they had witnessed up until then.

For two periods Raiders at their disorganized best, were obviously not going to put a hex on the Port Colborne Sailors, the team they upset in the port town 5 days before.

That logical thinking was the reason close to a hundred hockey watchers who slipped their greenback down prior to game time were elsewhere when Georgetown Raiders untangled their legs and exploded for seven goals in less than twelve minutes to crush last year's Ontario champions 8-3. It extended their win string to three.

Checking like customs officials the Sailors appeared to have Raiders number until the sky dropped. Raider pushes scattered at centre ice. Reactions changing plays consistently ended in Raider goals. And when a red shirted sailor did find himself momentarily unguarded in front of the Port cage, a masked native of the fruit belt by the name of Kenzie Day showed the drive like he was picking peaches.

At the other end of the sheet Raiders' best 1963 bargain, J. D. Cameron, was robbing Sailor marksmen (Marcelled) with moves that were even more amazing. But despite all his talents Montague's feeder, Kilpatrick was first to score. He cashed in on a perfect pass from McGowen and Gibson with the game 10 minutes and 53 seconds old. Just before the period ended Shilton jacked the Sailors lead to 2-0 after taking Montague's feeder.

Port Colborne had a big territorial edge over Georgetown in the first period and their domination was no less in the middle frame though they came out of it with the same two goal margin. Midway through the game Hardy's low bullet from a bad angle rapped off Co. 1022. Blake Inglis goal was scored while Raiders were playing five men to six.

Play was rugged but comparatively clean. Port Colborne drew 3 penalties and Raiders 5.
