One Period

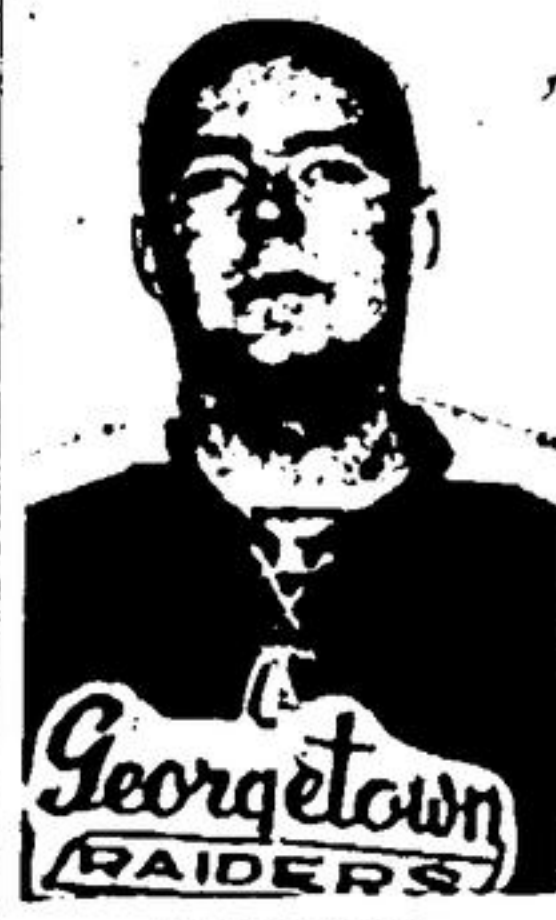
