SAYS WATER CHARGES UNFAIR TO TAXPAYERS

Dear Mr. Editor: If I may, I would appreciate seeing your paper once again to say a little on our present administration of the town water supply.

I agree with a town having to charge its users, but let us try and make it as fair as possible, as in my opinion based on an investigation of the facts over the past 3 to 4 years a large percentage of the people in this town are, according to the by-law as it reads now, paying for water they never use.

In addition, since the incorporation of the O.W.R.C. charges for the new sewage, these same people are paying the largest percentage of the debt while industrial concerns who show that most of their waste water is not passing through the sewage find themselves immune from this charge. But the householder who in the summer puts hundreds of gallons of water on his garden washes his car, etc., putting perhaps only approximately 50% through the sewage, what about him. I guess he is only a taxpayer and has to abide by what our council decides is best for him.

When our present water by-law 62-10 was revised in April 1952, I wonder how many councillors got up and said, as I am saying now, that by-law requires some amendments if it is to serve all our people fairly — but no it was easier to say nothing and let the public pay. Who cares who pays as long as it is paid.

Let's take Sect. 34 of this by-law which states — All rates are based on two months' consumption and no charge will be made for less than the minimum meter rate. Now if this means what it says: "No charge will be made for less than the minimum rate" — and the minimum rate is 6000 gal., therefore any consumer using less than this amount in two months should not be charged, but we are, and therefore the town is over-travelling its own by-law.

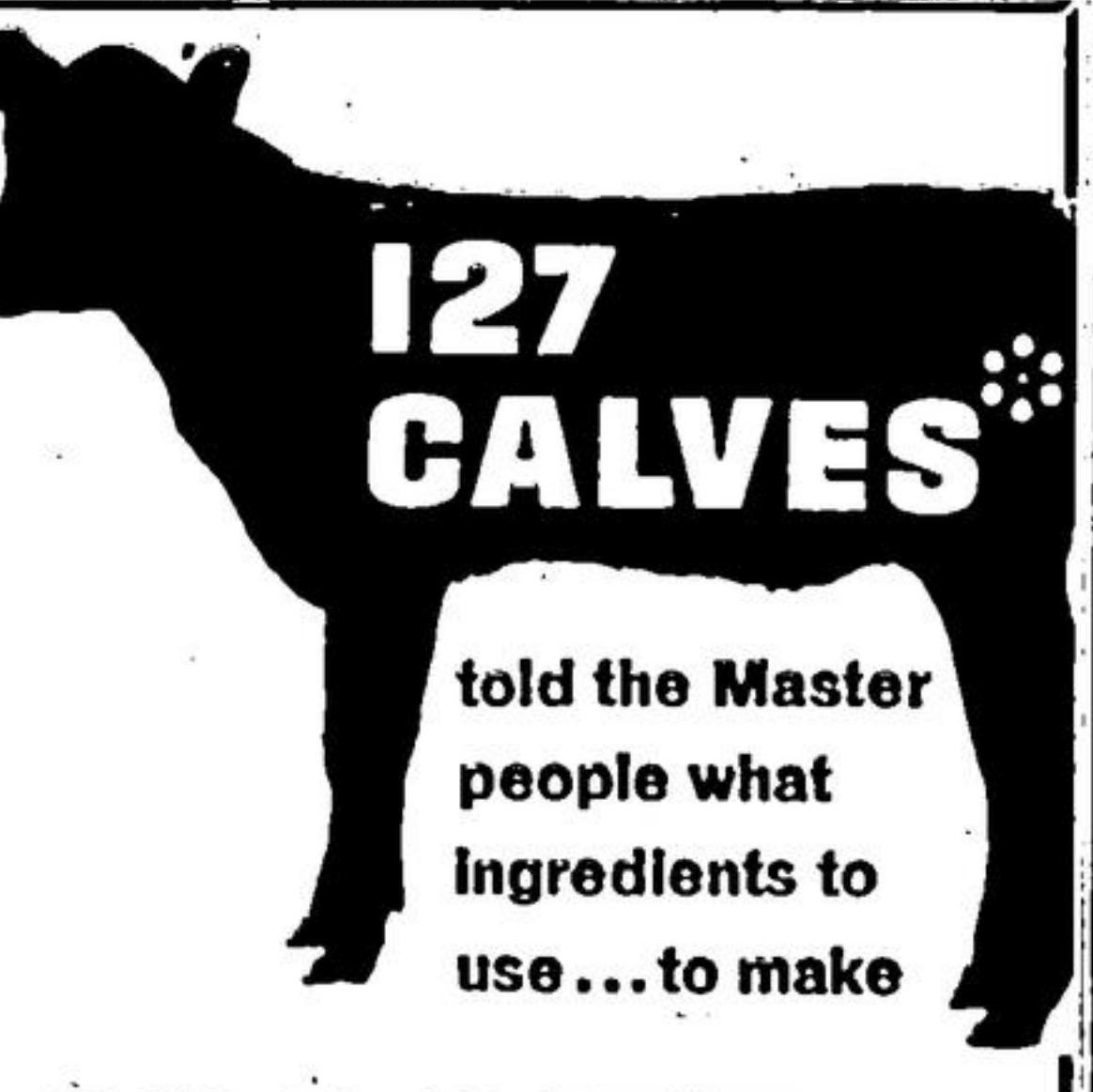
