326 District Men Get October Jobs

Was CPR Despatcher At Union Station In Toronto

A retired CPR railwayman and former Glen Williams resident, Stanley Beam died in Toronto Western Hospital on November 1st.

Mr. Beam had been with Canadian Pacific Railways from 1907 until he retired in 1950. He had worked as a night operator, station agent, traffic supervisor and in 1936 was promoted to train despatcher in Toronto Union Station.

Mr. and Mrs. Beam and family made their home at Willow Glen, Glen Williams from 1933 until 1946 and since then he has been a summer resident of the village.

Born in Norfolk County, he was the son of William Timothy Beam and Martha Anne Lawrence. He attended Simcoe High School and the Telegrapher's College. He was a member of the United Church and a life member of Moffat Lodge, A.F. & A.M. 300, Harriestville and a member of Hope Lodge 69, IOOF, Harriestville.

He leaves his wife, whom he married in North Dorchester in 1911, two sons, Harold of Bay Ridges and Edward of Toronto; a brother, Harry Beam of Detroit, Michigan and five grandchildren, Kenneth, Timothy, Bonnie, Nancy and Donald.

Rev. W. L. Brown of St. James United Church, Irlington, conducted the funeral service at the Butler Funeral Home, Irlington on Nov. 5th. Pallbearers were Flight Sgt. Murray Allen, Russell Malpass, Gilbert Schultz, W. Hyden, Edward Goridge and Kenneth Nichols, all of Toronto. Interment was in Park Lawn Cemetery. A Masonic memorial service was held the previous evening by members of Transportation Lodge.

Follows Father As County P-C Leader

A son followed in his father's footsteps, Thursday night at the Riverview, when Gordon Beattie of Acton was elected President of the Halton County Progressive Conservative Association. His father, W. J. Beattie, served in the same role in 1944 and 1945. Mr. Gordon Beattie succeeded Peter Tully of Burlington who declined to stand for another term, bringing with him tradition which had seen two presidents serve for two years.

The elections were carried out under the chairmanship of past president Leslie Clark of Georgetown. In addition to the president, other officers elected were: Vice President John Depue, O.C. of Milton, who has already served one year as vice president; Lady Vice President, Mrs. Glen Cooper of Oakville; Secretary, Allan (Bud) Nichols of Milton; Treasurer, George Kerr of Burlington; Andrew Frame, Y.P.C. representative, and auditors Ken Allen of Burlington and Mac Sprout of Etobicoke.

Retiring President Peter Tully felt that the Conservative defeat in Halton was due to complacency: "we each could have brought in one more vote," he stated, and we only had one hundred more votes to get.

"Anything but a rosy picture" was the way Treasurer George Kerr described the Association's financial situation, as he disclosed a total deficit of \$1,020. However, he felt with a little effort, and a general "chipping in," the deficit would be overcome.

Displaying the same mixture of self-criticism and determination of each speaker, the newly elected President stated: "We in Halton are defeated, have a deficit and are demoralized, but at least we can't get worse, we have to get better." He advocated a more business-like basis in the organization.

"No Conservative government is perfect," he admitted, "and certainly not this one either," but "we have nothing for which to apologize. From now on more offensive and less defensive is needed."

A nomination convention in January to choose a provincial candidate to replace the late Stan Hall, was forecast by Sandy Best, the Conservative standard bearer in a future election. While prophesying, he also suggested late winter or early spring as a possible time for a federal election. Continuing in that vein, he declared, "I hope for a good clean hard fought campaign. We will not stoop to methods used by other parties. It is not our nature or tradition."

He then introduced the guest speaker, Rev. A. Wallace Downer, former speaker of the Ontario legislature, dean of the Provincial Government and member since 1937 for Dufferin-Simcoe.

"I'm proud to be on the same platform as Sandy Best" he began, "a man respected by everyone." He commented ruefully on the difficult job of filling in for a Prime Minister. (Premier Roberts was originally scheduled to be guest speaker, but he then turned grapes and predicted a provincial election within 30 months. "Finding someone to fill the shoes of Stan Hall won't be easy," he opined.)

He went on to outline the accomplishments of the Conservative Government since they came to power in Ontario in 1942. He listed the jump in rural hydro from 45% of the farms to a present 97%, and the education grants from practically nothing in 1943 to \$241 million in 1942.

He reported the Walter Gordon report which had predicted a gross national product of 39 1/2 billions by 1965, when in fact the gross national product by June, 1942, was 39 1/2 billions.

He felt that the devaluation of the dollar and the misunderstanding of it, was largely responsible for the loss of sales in the last election. However, he upheld the devaluation saying it made the selling of Canadian goods abroad much easier.

This was the first such gathering in the northern end of the county, and more are expected in this area.
