LEGION KID HOCKEY

Mr. League hockey will get under way Tues. Nov. 27 starting at 5 p.m. For those who have not registered the fee is \$3.00. The age is 14 to 16, that is if you have not reached your 16th birthday before August 1, 1962, you will be eligible to play.

It is recommended by the executive that all Senior League players wear head helmets. You may obtain a helmet at a discount price by obtaining a voucher ticket from the executive or one of the Saturday morning commissioners.

The Legion hockey executive have made arrangements for players to obtain insurance. This insurance will be \$1 per player and will cover them while playing or practicing hockey in the arena.

The coverage is \$1500 accidental death benefits up to \$1500 medical benefits up to \$500 dental benefits.

In most cases the boy is covered by a medical insurance plan by his father or mother at their place of employment, but in most cases they do not have insurance to cover an injury to their own sound natural teeth.

A questionnaire will be sent home with every player to find out how many parents want this hockey insurance for their boy. This insurance will not start until there are 75 boys enrolled in the plan.

AREA CODES SPEED LONG DISTANCE CALLS

Note change in code beginning December 2, the Area Code for long distance calling to the Ontario communities of Peterborough, Lindsay, Beaverton, and surrounding centres changes to 705. When calling long distance you'll find it helps to know the Area Code for the community you wish to reach.

North America has been divided into Numbered Plan Areas (NPA) for long distance purposes, and each NPA is identified by a three-figure Area Code. Area Codes for many centres on this continent are listed in the introductory pages of your telephone directory. Georgetown, for instance, together with Brampton and Toronto is in the 416 area. Anyone outside this area calling you should associate this Area Code with your number. If, for example, they were calling the Georgetown telephone number 877-9882, they should consider the full number as 416-877-9882. The same principal applies to calls WE make outside our own NPA. (Long distance calls placed within the Numbering Plan Area do not require the Area Code. Those who dial their own long distance calls by Direct Distance Dialing find it saves time if they know the Area Code of the place they're calling. Also if you place long distance calls through an operator, you'll find it goes through smoother if you give the Area Code. May we suggest that you give your Area Code along with your telephone number to your out-of-town friends and business acquaintances. It will help to speed their calls to you.
