Local Players in Clever Satire

In the unlikely locale of a mental home, words of wisdom, subtly disguised as humorous chatter, contributed greatly to the main plot in John Patrick's play 'The Cynical Savage' presented last week by the Georgetown Little Theatre Group. The group had ensured their success by the choice of this cleverly written satirical drama, which comments ironically on man's judgment of the so-called normal and abnormal behaviour. The scene throughout is a rest home for the not so poor. Its name, 'The Cloisters' suggests that it has become to the inmates or guests as they are euphemistically called a retreat from reality. Mrs. Savase, her title is a pun on their name, played to the hilt by Pat Barthele is committed to the home by her 'loving' family for the grave crime of giving her money to other than themselves. Heloise as this act might be, it is compounded by the fact she doesn't seem to have her money to supposedly 'worthy' charities, but to a fund which would in judge whims and unrealistic dreams of the deserving and undeserving alike. Her family, played by Michael Perichak, Bruce Markson and Florence Cowan, a trio of scholars, achieve their purpose, that of alienating any sympathy the audience might have had for them. By contrast, the guests are all endearing, warm and lovable. Mrs. Gobel plays a young mother who hasn't accepted the death of her child and carries a doll which she believes to be him. With instinctive understanding the others go along with this. Candice Hunt, statistician by trade, has fulfilled his life's desire by saving grotesquely on the violin, and believing he is a great musician who won't play a note, convinced his long since dead wife his scars would result the audience. Edith Baumgartner who is so convincing she becomes Fairy May, craves affection and has convinced her plain shabby self she is a great beauty. Mrs. Paddy or Vera Macdonald, who never speaks except to list in alteration the things she hates, is perhaps the most pathetic of all. Both the nurse and the doctor played by Anne Doncaster, and Ronnie Hill show the understanding and warmth demanded by their position. Towards the conclusion of the play, Mrs. Paddy (Vera Macdonald) in a moving scene, finally finds her voice to speak words of love rather than hate. The final scene, where eerie bluish lights come up to reveal each character's fantasy world and the main character Mrs. Savage, leaving it for the real world, is most effective. A great deal of the credit for the success of the production must go to Peter Macdonald, the director, who undoubtedly helped to bring the cast to an understanding of their roles. As in all productions behind the scenes laboured many other willing hands. The production manager and programme secretary was Catherine Hunt, light
