## Home Economist Gives Views on Chocolate Milk

Since moving to Halton and Peel Counties in August, Mrs. K. Cottam, Home Economist with the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, has selected from inquiries an unusual problem. On several occasions in recent weeks information has been requested on the subject of chocolate milk and plain milk or regular beverage.

The chocolate milk versus plain milk controversy is a continuous one. Our school principals are often plagued with the decision of which beverage to have available for school lunches. It is difficult to estimate the proportion of each which is consumed, but in schools where both are available probably the ratio is about three to one in favour of chocolate.

There are three facts when considering chocolate milk as a regular beverage for children and teenagers:

1. Chocolate milk provides over forty per cent more calories than plain milk. This may be important when we are concerned about the weight control problem of some children and teenagers.
2. Chocolate milk has considerable added sugar which can of course lead to a great amount of tooth decay.
3. Chocolate is believed to increase the problem of acne, our common teenage complexion worry. Many teen agers are unaware or unconvinced of the harm these favourite beverages are doing to their complexion.

Let us always remember, however, that chocolate milk is better than soda pop or no milk. We should not condemn chocolate milk entirely, but plain milk has advantages over chocolate milk.
