The devotional period was led by Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Skilling. Following the devotional a game of darts was introduced with the men oppos-

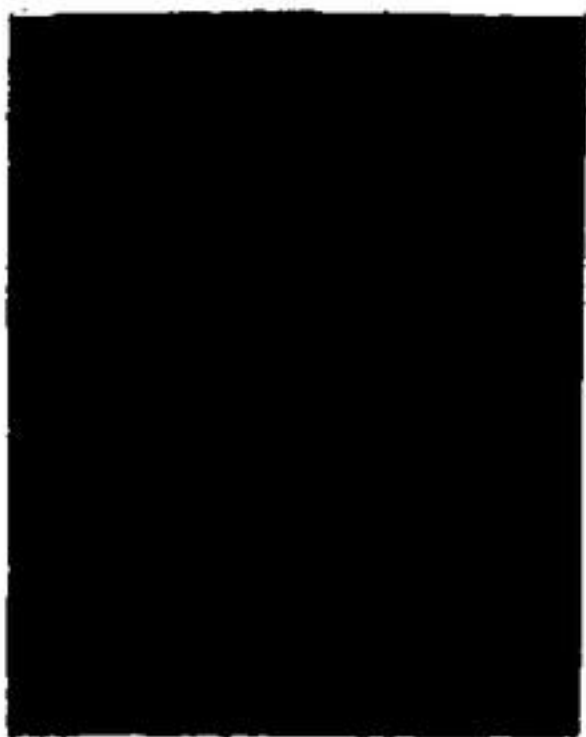
ing the women. Despite an indefinite score, the game proved interesting to all who took part.

Q. Do you believe taxes will rise in 1963?

A. I feel the tax rate can and must be held. This alone will be a tremendous job. It will require strong leadership, but it can be held.

Q. What is the financial picture of the present time?

A. It would appear at the present time that the year end deficit will be at least \$40,000.

Q. Can the deficit be eliminated without raising taxes?

A. Yes, but it cannot be eliminated in 1 year. It would have to be a 3 year plan.

Q. What created this financial chaos?

A. Most of the blame should go to the lack of leadership of the Mayor and the incompetence of the Finance Chairman. This present Council have been like a headless man with no purpose or direction. They had no interim statements for the first 9 months of the year. In plain words they didn't have a clue as to what they had spent.

Q. What about Industrial Growth?

A. I believe we will progress in this direction provided we put the Town on a sound financial basis. One of the major difficulties is the fact that all available industrial land is controlled by one Company. We must have competitive lands to interest any future industrialist.

Q. Are you opposed to spending money on the roads in the Dalrex area?

A. This impression arises from vicious propaganda. In 1961 when I was Mayor, more money was spent on road surfacing in the Dalrex area than in any previous year. We spent almost \$50,000, and this is double the amount the present Council spent this year. I am opposed to relieving the Developer from his obligations because this in turn is an added burden to YOU the taxpayer.

Q. Would you do any more road surfacing in Dalrex?

A. Yes, in 1961, as I stated, we did spend almost \$50,000 on surfacing and made plans to complete this in 1962. However, nothing was done in 1962, so it must be completed next year.

Q. If this year's Council could not afford to finish this surfacing, how can you promise this?

A. Essential should come first, this year many frills were placed first on the list, particularly if these frills were made of concrete. Enough money was spent foolishly and mysteriously to have had these roads completed.

Q. What would you do about Guelph St?

A. The condition is deplorable, however I feel this must be done on a 3 year plan.

I feel we must make it a good and safe road, but I do not believe in providing a Super Highway through Georgetown at our expense.

Q. Why do you say a 3 year program?

A. I feel it must be done out of current funds and not added to our Debtature Debt.

Q. What is our Debtature Debt?

A. Almost three and a half million dollars.

Q. Can all of the Debtature Debt be attributed to Dalrex Developments and recent Councils?

A. No. Some of it was caused by Councils in the 1930's and 1940's when the taxes were kept down at the expense of improvement. Some of it was caused by 1950's Council's when they did many of those necessary improvements on borrowed capital rather than current capital.

Q. Many of the Candidates have stated they would stop the bickering that is going on. A great deal of the blame is laid on your doorstep. Why?

A. As long as Councils from 1954 onwards went along with any proposal that the Developer presented, regardless of the consequence to the general taxpayer, there was no bickering. The bickering started when some of us took a more realistic approach to our present troubles and said "NO" to further residential land release. Most of the bickering will stop if the Leader, which is the mouthpiece for a privately owned development company, is stopped. Another solution to stop the bickering would be to release all the residential lands and ruin forever your chances of a realistic value on the hard-earned dollars that you have invested in Georgetown.

Q. Many of the Candidates evaded Questions on the ratie issue by referring to the decision of the Dept. of Municipal Affairs. Do you think it was proper to submit this to the D.M.A.

A. On September 10th, 1962, I, and three members of the present council met with the Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs in Toronto on an unofficial visit, and as a result the matter to present this problem to the D.M.A. was presented to Council.

Q. Do you feel all of the Candidates are showing their true colours and taking an honest stand in this election?

A. No. I know that one of my opposition on the Mayoralty ballot is openly campaigning on the very ballots that I have stood for, and have proven that I stand for, and yet this same candidate is secretly supporting other people that are in favour of Residential Land Release — with no strings. In other words, being a true politician rather than an honest representative.
