

## Fire Poster Prizes To Milton, Burlington

A Milton boy and a Burlington girl have been judged winners in the 1962 fire prevention poster contest sponsored by the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau.

Martha Morgan, 10, of 854 Cedar Blvd., Burlington, was top girl in the contest entered by hundreds of Halton's Gr. 5 students. Martha is a student at Glenview Public School, David Downie, 11, of 64 John St., Milton, a J. M. Doney public school student, was the top boy artist.

Get Trophies  
A banquet in their honour will be held at the Milton Fire Hall on Monday evening, November 26th at 7 p.m. They will be presented with the Halton Fire Insurance Co. trophies, which are retained for a year by their schools. They

will also receive individual trophies, an engraved desk pen set.

The students' teachers, principals and parents will be special guests at the banquet. The Fire Prevention Bureau has also invited representatives of the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office, and the contest judge from the St. Catharines Fire Dept. to attend the dinner.

The two winning posters, each showing five causes of fire in the home and their prevention, will be entered in the new Ontario Fire Chiefs' Association, province-wide competition early next year. The two winners of the Ontario contest will each receive a \$100 bond.

"The Bureau was quite pleased with the entries in this year's contest," said Deputy Chief George Bunnell of Milton Fire Dept., the 1962 chairman of the county bureau. He explained the contest was conducted in all Halton schools during the October Fire Prevention week, to help emphasize the danger of fire to children.

### SOFT DRINKS CAN QUENCH SMALL FIRE

A soft drink bottle containing carbonated beverages is the handiest, least expensive extinguisher for small fires in your car or home, Fire chief Bob Bonfield of Georgetown said today.

Chief Bonfield said the carbonation in a pop bottle is pressure enough to quench any small paper, wood or textile type of fire. Simply shake it up and make a small hole in the cap of the bottle, then spray the contents towards the base of the flames, he said.

This type of makeshift extinguisher is not suitable for oil, grease or electrical fires, however. It's still wise to have a regular extinguisher.

## Wind, Snow Control is Tested on County Farms

Although Halton County is not located in any of the recognized snow belt areas of Ontario it does receive a substantial snowfall each year. The average snowfall each year over the last 40 years has been about 46 inches. In 1961 the total snowfall was approximately 48 inches, while 1960 gave Halton County more than 5 feet of snow. The County has a predominantly west or southwest wind which commonly reaches speeds of 25 miles per hour. The result is heavy drifting and snow accumulation around roads and buildings.

With the adoption of open front buildings, Halton County's farm operators pressed for a method of controlling wind and snow. Many operators experimented with windbreak fences where the natural wind break hedge or bush was not available. The use of high closed fences however, gave varying results in different locations. In many instances more problems were created while a few gave excellent results.

Fortunately the Dept. of Engineering Science at the Ontario Agricultural College in Guelph had been studying the effects of wind on buildings. The Department decided to study the possibilities of controlling wind and snow accumulation around farm buildings. As they progressed in their studies personnel with the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture were informed of their findings. Their suggestions were promptly used on many Halton County farms and their success prompted increased study. It was found that the location and shape of a building as well as the location of silos and feed bunks, were as important as the size and location of

"The Georgetown Leader" a rather pretentious name for a publication which gives anything but leadership was, by its own admission founded for one purpose: "To tell the company's story." It does not seem to be disturbed by the fact that only the smallest of fractions of the local population want to listen to this story and even tries to increase its audience by almost forcefully gi-

ving away free issues.
