TRI-COUNTY HOCKEY

Georgetown Juveniles' Ken Morrow received one game suspension for drawing four minor penalties in one game, only to find out later he will be out for the season when a pin came loose in his arm. The Midgets didn't fare much better as Jan Popiel drew a three game suspension for his match misconduct penalty in Burlington last week. The Mustangs on Tuesday beat Orangeville 7 to 2 but played an ineligible player in Teacock and might have lost their points had not Orangeville been in the same boat, using three ineligible players also. A Guelph win was reversed for using such players against Hespeler. Pee Wee and Novice kept the committee room clear with no faults this past week. Georgetown will be represented by Sid Alcorn, President of All Star Minor Hockey Support Group and Bill Richmond, District Representative, at the Annual President's Dinner of the Tri-County at Hawthorne Lodge in Milton on Monday, December 10th. Team classifications will be hashed out at the executive meeting following the dinner.

RULES In the recent edition of Hockey Canada, rule changes which will affect hockey in Georgetown were explained and for those who don't eat the magazine here is one: As pointed out the most important change in the rules is Number 44b, which states that any player using his stick as a weapon in an altercation shall be considered as deliberately attempting to injure and shall be subject to a five-minute major penalty and a match misconduct. This means that if a player swings his stick at another with intent to injure, the major and match misconduct will automatically be imposed. This would apply, even if two players engage in a stick-duel in which the sticks are raised and brought together above the players' heads without a blow actually being landed on either of the adversaries. As long as the intent to injure is there, majors and match penalties should be imposed. In previous years, such incidents have often resulted only in two-minute minor penalties for high sticking.
