### Service Station Man Two Years Councillor

A member of Georgetown council for the past two years, James A. (Jim) Brown succumbed to a heart attack at his home in Waterloo early Monday morning.

He had moved to Waterloo only two months ago, after purchasing a service station which he was operating as Jim's Esso Service. Prior to that he had resided with his wife and family at 30 Sargent Road.

First elected to council by general vote in 1960, Mr. Brown was returned as a Ward 3 representative this year. He first served as chairman of the welfare, ambulance and hospital committee and this year was completing his term as chairman of public works.

Born in Nottingham, England in 1907, he served during the war with the London Fire-fighters organization. He came to Canada in 1951 and first lived at Pickering where he worked with Pye Electric Co. He was a member of Doris Masonic lodge there. He later joined C.N.R. Telecommunications in Toronto.

He moved to Georgetown in 1957. He was a member of St. George's Anglican Church. He leaves his wife, Daisy (Laurie) Lawrence, and one daughter, Lesley.

He reminded his audience that the only effective Medicare plan is the one put forward by the NDP, terming the Liberals' hazy and confused and the Conservatives' "nothing more than continuance of present private insurance and PSI coverage which is totally inadequate."
