Hail Storm Damage Discussion Subject

The tremendous losses suffered by farmers from hail in storms on May 20th and July 13, 1962, prompted the main topic for the annual meeting of the Burlington and District Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association.

A survey by this Association following the hailstorms shows that crop damage ranged as high as 95 per cent on some farms, while others suffered severe breakage to greenhouse and hotbed glass.

Mr. J. F. Paterson, representing the Southland Insurance Service Ltd., of Leamington, Ontario, outlined the various insurance coverages available. Outdoor crops ranging from grain, tree fruits and vegetables may be insured, as well as crops grown under glass.

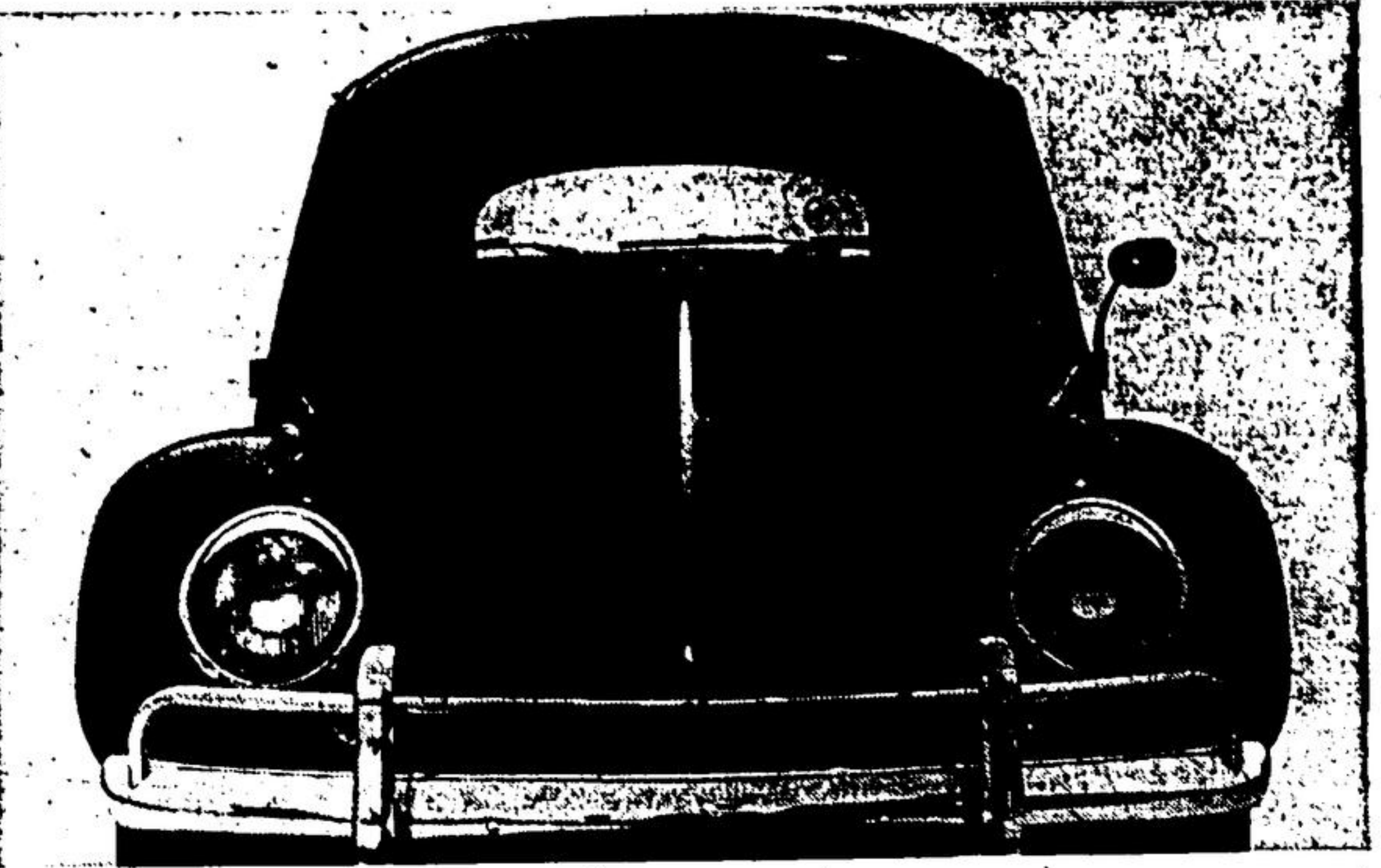
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
