ST. PETER'S IS CHRISTENDOM'S LARGEST CHURCH

Twelve years ago, at Christmas, the late Pope Pius XII announced that excavators had found the tomb of the Apostle Peter precisely where Roman Catholics had believed it to be — beneath the papal altar of the church which bears its name.

St. Peter's, the largest church in Christendom, was built in Rome 336 years ago over the tomb of the Galilean fisherman. A masterpiece of the Italian Renaissance, the church represents the composite skills of some of Italy's greatest artists, including Michelangelo, Raphael, Bramante and Bernini.

Many Visitors

The church attracts visitors of many faiths because it is not merely a Roman Catholic shrine but an archive of history recorded in hundreds of monuments, sarcophagi, inscriptions, statues and mosaic murals. 9 queens are buried there: Christina of Sweden, Charlotte of Cyprus, and Clementina, the mother of Bonnie Prince Charlie.

The church's massive foundations dig into the soil which was a place of soothsaying in pagan times.

Nero built his Circus at the foot of Vatican Hill. Christians were tortured there and burned alive. Tradition says the Apostle Peter was crucified head down in the arena.

Renovation

In recent months, St. Peter's has undertaken a program of interior renovation; metal stands to replace the cumbersome old wooden structures put up for audiences of more than 70,000; indirect lighting; a new electrical system controlling the bells; a new organ and a new elevator.

The old elevator had lifted an estimated 20,000,000 pilgrims about 180 feet closer to paradise, their immediate destination being the roof of the basilica.

Full Time Fire Chief Appointed in Milton

Milton's Fire Chief Albert E. "Babe" Clement has been hired as fire chief on a full time basis as of January 1, 1963. The decision was accepted Friday by members of the Milton Fire Area Commission, composed of council appointed men, representing Milton, Oakville, Burlington, Essex and Mississauga Township which are served by the Milton Fire Department.

Member 38 Years

Recently, the Fire Department requested the Fire Area Commission to hire a full time chief and two full time inspectors to carry out building inspections, fire prevention work and the necessary administration of the 58 man volunteer fire brigade. The Commission felt it could not afford to have more than one man at the present time, although members realized the need of more permanent staff.

Chief Clement joined the fire department in 1925. He served as Deputy Chief two years before being promoted to chief in 1951, a position which he has held since. His salary will be \$8,000 per year, plus \$500 car allowance.

At present, Chief Clement is employed by the town as operator of the sanitation plant, and spends only part of his time carrying out the duties of fire chief. The fire department serves a population of about 15,000 people.

TO BUY OR NOT TO BUY

During recent weeks thousands of Christmas trees were purchased by individual deals for home decorations.

While the legal sale of trees goes on, there are people who delight in driving out to the country, and take a chance of being caught stealing one.

Why spoil a Christmas morning about who is knocking on the door.

During the past few years, several people have been caught in the act of stealing trees. (In some cases stolen trees have been traced to homes where they have been found completely decorated.) Fines from \$25 to \$100 have been levied for such offences.
