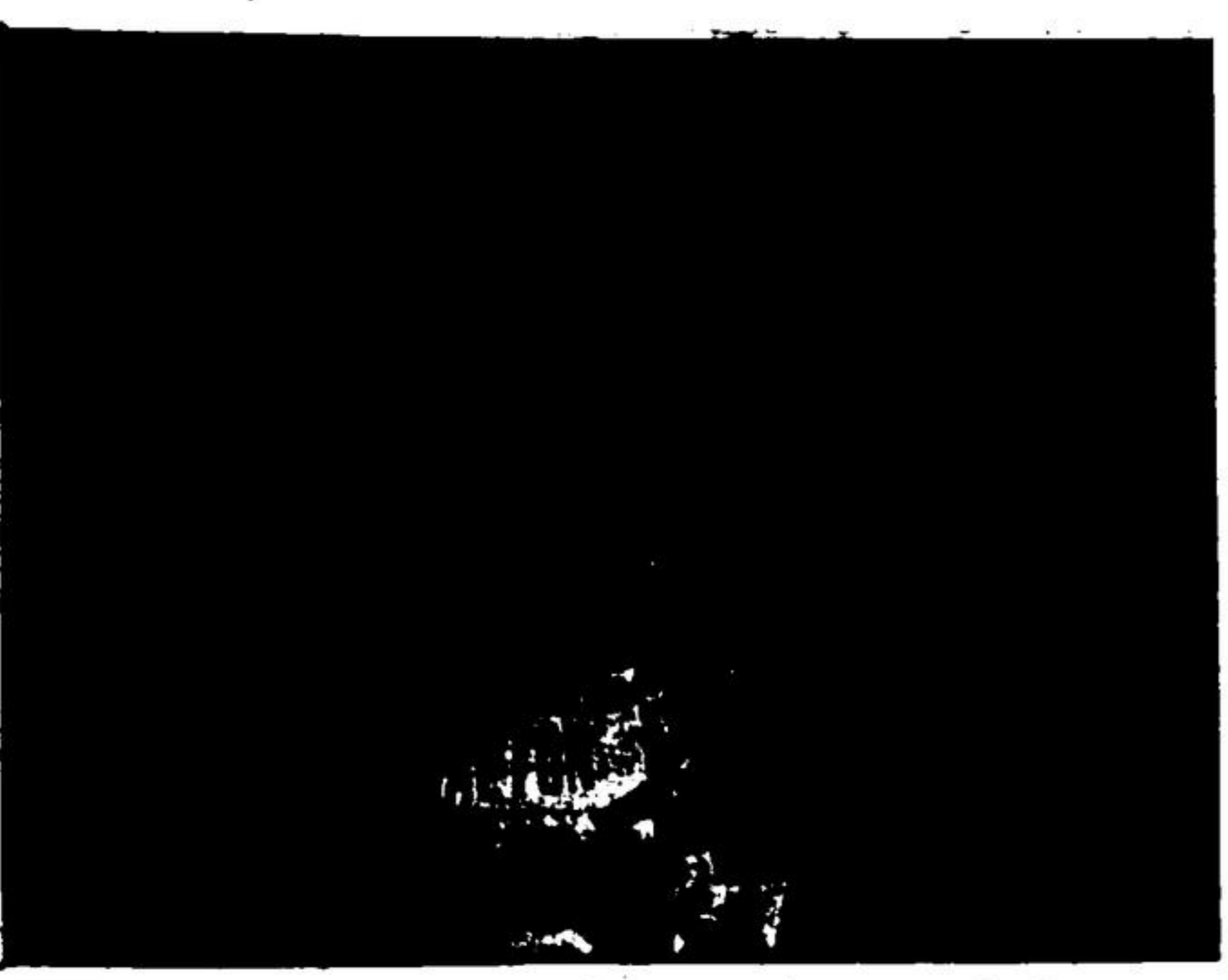
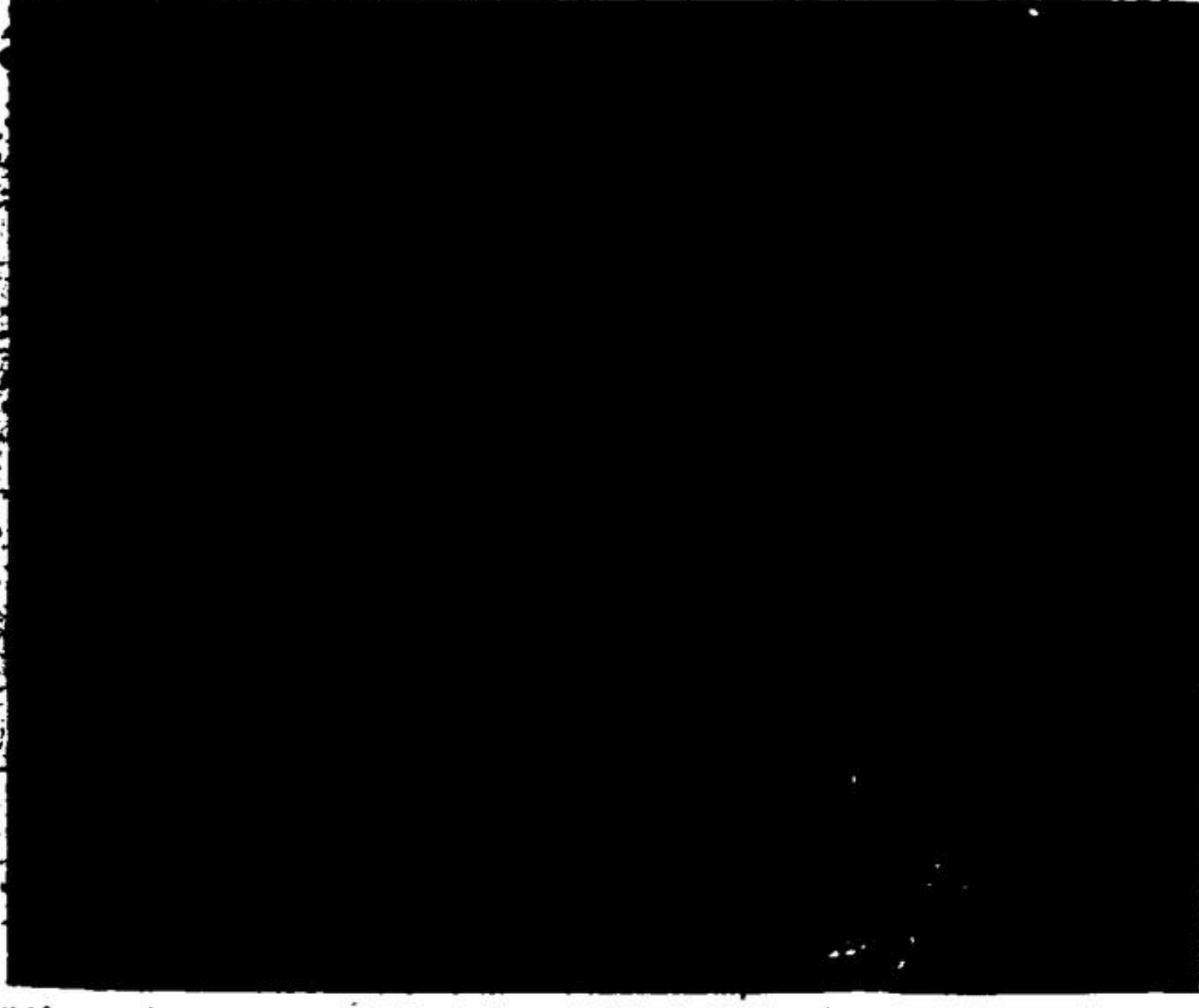

"Rep by Pop" Question Vigorous County Debate

The war between the North and the South was renewed at the Halton County Council last week when the age old cry of "representation by population" was again the cause of strife. The battle broke out when an application for a private bill that would equalize the voting power in the County was debated vigorously. Council did agree in principle to the giving of additional votes to Burlington and Oakville but the number and distribution of them proved to be a stumbling block.

Four Votes Each
Present voting strength in the County gives four votes each to Burlington, Oakville, Esquesing and Georgetown, on a basis of each having over 3000 municipal electors. Milton and Acton have three votes each and Nassagaweya, two.

Could Change System
Pointing out the injustice of the present voting system, Oakville Deputy-Reeve Herb Merriam explained that five years ago the south had ten men representing ten to twelve thousand citizens, but today Oakville and Burlington together have four members with eight votes representing eighty-seven thousand citizens.

Reeve John Elliott of Georgetown suggested votes could be added on the basis of each additional five thousand voters. As the population increases, votes would be added for every three thousand electors to a maximum of 12 votes or 27,000 electors.

South Should Know
Deputy Reeve Irving Ryckman of Burlington explained the need for a change in voting power was brought about for all business.

• "Seven new classrooms will be added to George Kennedy School by September, 1962," public school board chairman Ed Wilson told the Harrison Home and School meeting Monday night. He pointed out that the addition to Kennedy is the only alternative to shifts classes.

• A new year and a new dance hall were launched amid sparkling gaiety New Year's Eve when the beautiful Riviera opened its doors for the first time. Surprise was mirrored on most faces when they saw the interior. The sunken dance floor, the canopied bandstand, and the circular mezzanine took them aback.

10 YEARS AGO

• A district school burned to the ground early Friday morning and 26 pupils have been routed to another school two miles away. Destroyed by fire was the Union School, 3A, Esquesing, where children in the Terra Cotta and Union districts receive their primary education. The cause was an oil space heater.

• George Leslie, reeve of Esquesing, is Halton County's warden for 1953. Mr. Leslie was unanimously chosen by county council this week for the top county office. A veteran member of Esquesing Council he is in his second term as reeve.

25 YEARS AGO

• The Cedarvale School for Girls, one of the number of institutions maintained by the United Church of Canada will complete ten years of service shortly. The school, which is supervised by Miss Jessie Oliver, who has been superintendent since 1928, undertakes the care and the training of many underprivileged girls under 16 years of age.
