Seeks Changes for Political Broadcasts

Ottawa (Special to the Herald) — Changes in the Canada Broadcasting Act and the Broadcasting Act, with respect to the broadcasting of political programs, are being sought in parliament by Dr. Harry Harley, Liberal MP for Halton.

He has introduced two bills which, if passed, would have the effect of amending the present regulations which prohibit any political broadcast in Canada on the day of any federal or provincial, or municipal election, and for two days prior to it.

Prohibits Broadcast

Dr. Harley points out that a rigid interpretation of the two acts as they now exist prohibits a local political broadcast in Vancouver if there is a municipal election being held in Halifax. As a case in point, he says that one of his own Members from Parliament broadcast was recently cancelled because there was an election being held in Newfoundland.

"My bills would not make any change with respect to federal elections as these are general and take place in all areas where a broadcast may be made," Dr. Harley explains. "What I am proposing is that the acts be clarified to prohibit such broadcasts only in areas where they would reach listeners in places where an election is being held."

Maybe Illegal

He points out that a local broadcast from one radio or television station, aimed at a particular area in Ontario, is not going to affect a provincial election in Saskatchewan or a municipal election in some other part of Ontario which can not hear the broadcast.

A strict interpretation of the acts might have been applied in the case of Toronto and Hamilton, Dr. Harley states. It may have been illegal for Toronto stations to broadcast results of the Toronto municipal elections because a civic election was being held in Hamilton within range of the Toronto broadcasts, two days later.
