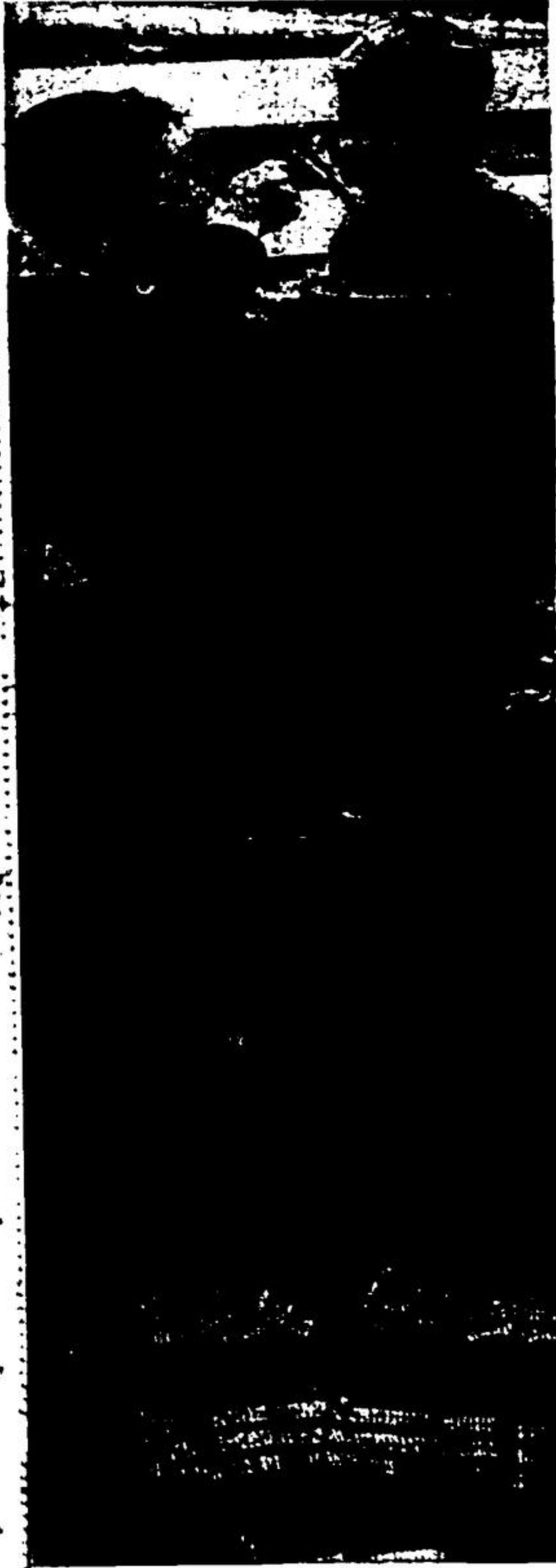

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Dog Quarantined Fox Proves Rabid

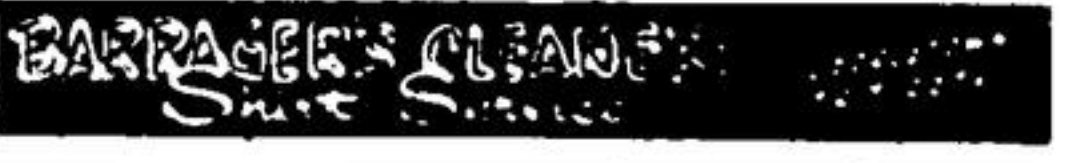

Norvalites Still Seek School Bus for Children

Two familiar faces at Esquesing School Board meetings this year, Joe Schertzl and Bruce Nixon, were on hand again Tuesday to seek transportation for 22 children in the Norval area to Norval school. During former visits, the delegates asked for transportation for the pupils and to date have received no reply.

Mr. Schertzl told the board he had been transporting his children for the past seven years and in view of his taxes for education being hiked up yearly he felt "entitled to a few benefits". The 22 children involved all attend Norval school.

TWO ALTERNATIVES
Board members referred the request to the transportation committee who promised an answer to the transportation problem by the next meeting. Present for the meeting were Mrs. Armstrong, Mac Sprout, Stanley Brown and Bill Lawson. Absent on account of illness was chairman R. J. Cunningham. Mac Sprout was chosen acting secretary for the meeting since acting secretary Miss R. F. Evans was unable to attend.

Transportation chairman Bill Lawson informed the delegate the board did not have to accept the children at Stewart school on account of the boundary lines and overworked staff. He also wondered if the children were bused one way to Norval school, how they would be returned home, as the bus was in use until after 5 p.m. in the evening. "The last time we were here, we had two problems, now it has been whittled down to one," Mr. Schertzl, members agreed it would be most economical to provide the additional bus for 22 children.

Council Inaugural Set for January 7th
