Oakville Will Get Isolation Centre

Oakville will be the site of Ontario's first district isolation centre for animals suspected of rabies, Deputy-Roove H. Merry who is also president of the Oakville Humane Society, told Halton County Council last week.

The centre he said, would house pets from the area between Toronto and Hamilton, as far north as Georgian Bay and would cost twelve thousand dollars.

George Leslie, Roove's questioning, objected strongly to the centre being limited to pets. "Space for cattle must be included in any isolation centre," he contended.

"Farmers in our area have lost several cows. They have no means of isolating cattle and suspects are a threat to their herds and to themselves."

Plans for the shelter will be discussed by County Council and the General Manager of the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals at the next meeting.

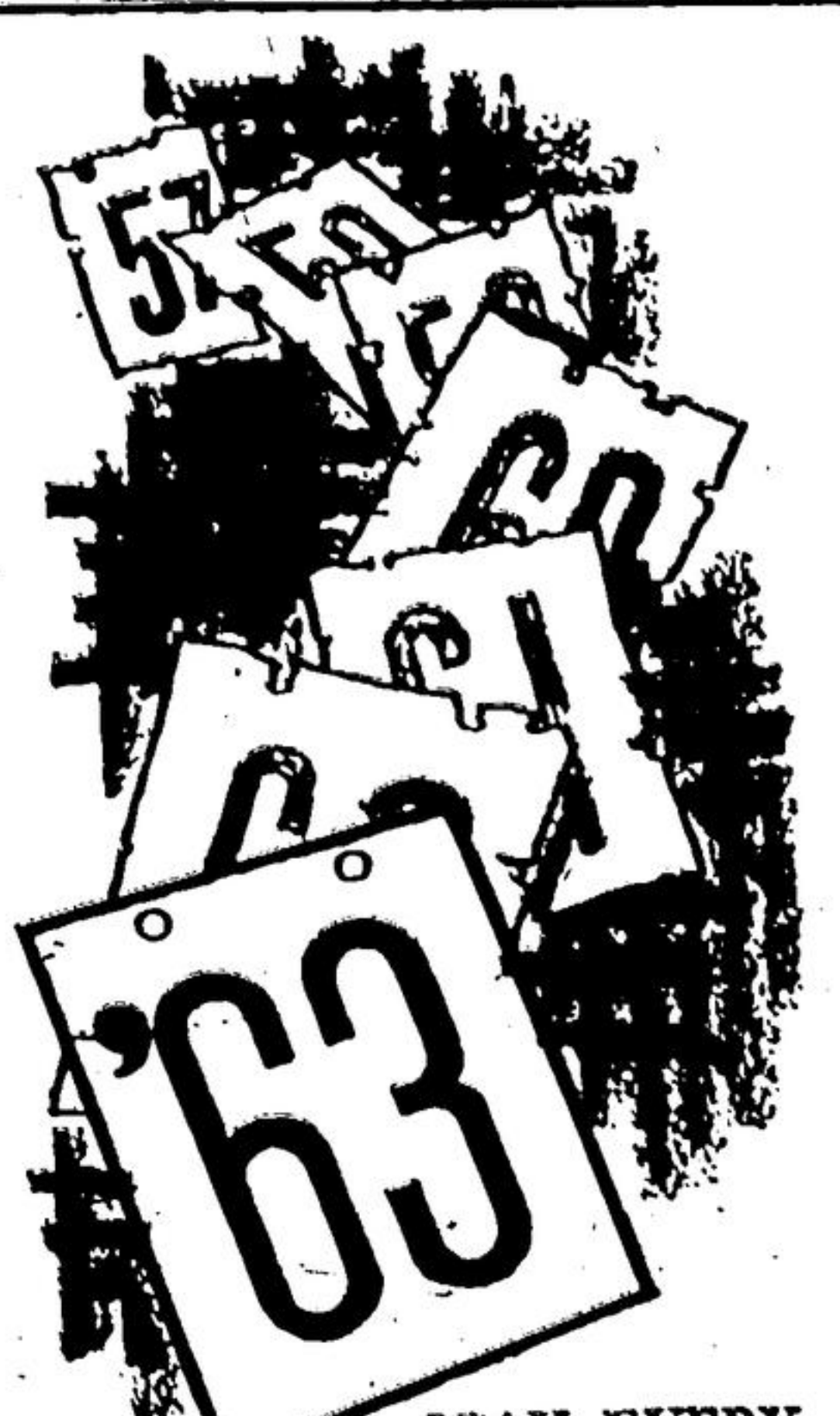

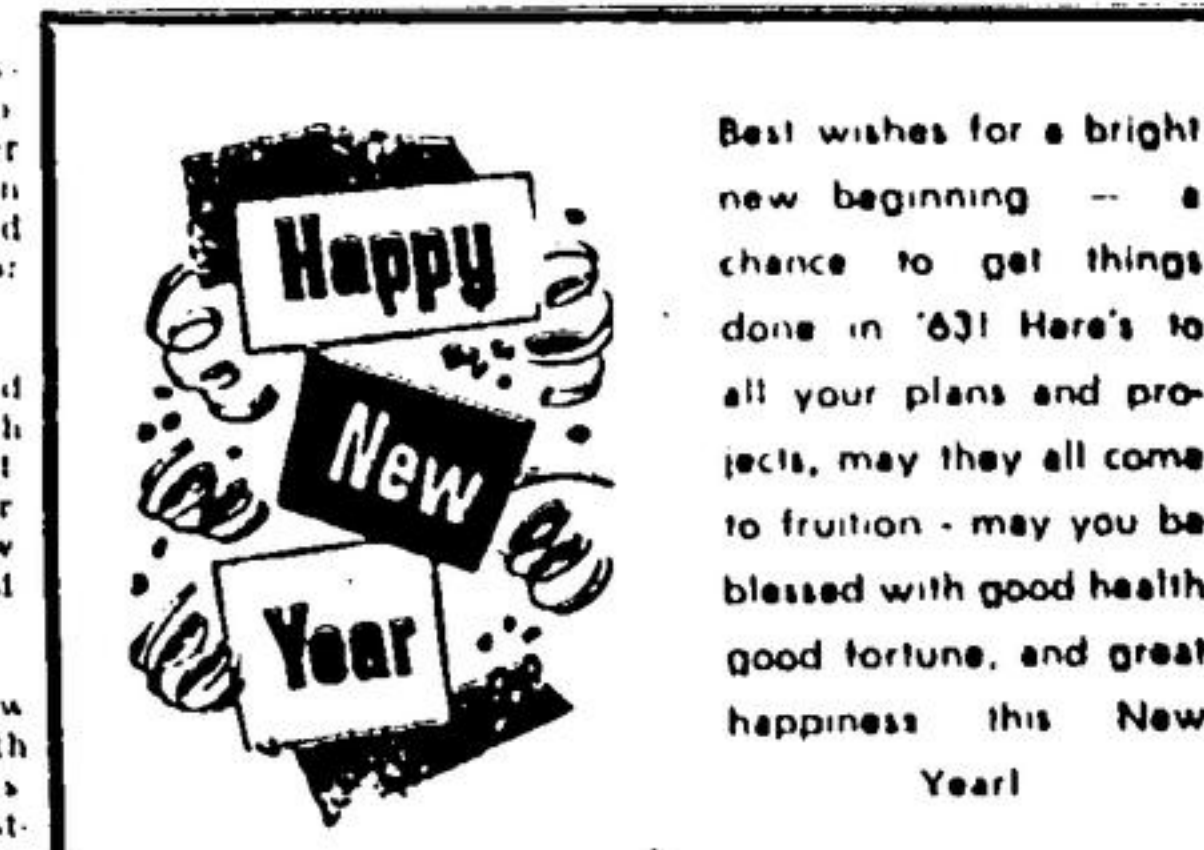
