Promising Year For Midget Hockey Team

The 1963 edition of the Georgetown Midgets has rocketed into this new campaign in winning fashion and if their pace is maintained, this should be the season of the glowing record.

Better balance, both on defense and offense and sound goaltending is the key to the team's success.

Seven of last year's personnel are retained in this year's expansion and eleven of last year's best Bantam players were added at the start of the schedule and developed rapidly into Midget calibre workers.

Here is a brief thumbnail sketch of the team members as appraised by their coach. The goalies are RICHARD BRADY and FRED COWBROUGH. Richard (Beaver) who was the sub-goalie last term has played very steadily when called upon and the previous experience in this league has been invaluable to him. Fred is also a good goalie as anyone who witnessed him in the International Bantam Tourney last season will quickly confirm. He was one of the main reasons Georgetown went so far.

On defense are ROD PRESWOOD, WAYNE DAVISON, DOUG MALCOLM and JIM POPIEL. Both ROD and Wayne were on last year's Midget team and both are assets to the defense as well as scoring threats when they put their minds on helping the offense. They have excellent shots.

Doug and Jan are graduates from Bantam hockey in their first year of Midget. Jan is possibly the better rushing defenseman but Doug has found his niche in a checking role and has looked better every time out. The pair make a very solid wall.

Up front, TERRY LAINE centres, MIKE CUMMINS and JIM BLAIR on the first forward line. Terry was shifted from right wing to centre late last season and has benefited by the move. He is a good play maker as well as a consistent scorer. Mike Cummins has a good wrist shot and is quick to get it away. Jim is the line's workhorse, he is a good skater and one of the team's real fast men. All three were on last year's team.

AL BLAIR, DON NORTON and WAYNE REID have been welded into the second unit. Al is a very good player and can be used at centre, right wing, or if need be, on defense. Don has been playing on right wing and could be one of the standouts. He is a particularly good skater and checker, but will always contribute his share of goals. Wayne is a very smart, heady type player and will set up a lot more goals for this line before the season is out.

Comprising the checking line are MARTY WHEELER, DAVE SHEPHERD and RON LANE. Marty, the line's center, is a good skater and checker and seldom misses a good scoring opportunity. Dave is much like his centre in all three departments and likes the work. Ron has developed his reactions to slamming in rebounds to the point where it has become his own personal trademark. All three on this line are members of the 1961-62 Bantams and can hold their own against the most experienced Midgets on any club.

DEL BEAUMONT coaches the team, BUD JAMES is the manager and BILL JAMES is the assistant manager.

The Midgets play their home games, as a rule, on Thursday nights.

Beaumont Scoring Spree Helps Beat Dundas 10-6

Junior Beaumont celebrated a secret anniversary scoring six goals against Dundas Graftons in an intermediate A game here last Thursday night.

One year he had announced to the Herald that he was considering calling it quits at the end of the 1961-62 season. The explosive scoring spree was just another friendly reminder that he hadn't.

His half dozen goals were almost two thirds of the Raiders attack as they ended their points famine and dropped Dundas 10-6.

A win was almost a must since this was one of the two games the Raiders held in hand over the first place Welland Merchants.

Raiders ran up an 8-2 margin in the first two periods and then noticeably eased up in the third. Dundas outscored the host club 4-2 in the final frame, but the outcome was never in doubt.

Dundas did own a brief lead. Big Bill Serlie from Laufman put his team in front after just 30 seconds but their reign was short. Moe Galand, who picked up a hat trick in Beaumont's shadow, tied things, seconds later and Beaumont kicked off his party at 4:41 to give Georgetown a lead.

Blanked in Second Laufman from Knight made it 2-2 at the 5:58 mark and Beaumont snatched the lead back at 8:50.

Dundas were blanked by Barry Smith and Capanony in the second period while Raiders nched holes in the Grafton defense. Beaumont banged in his 3rd and 4th from his parking spot to the right of the goal crease. Galand and Blake Inglis assisted on the first, and the second was unassisted.

Moe Galand took a turn with help from Gord Thompson and Blake Inglis, and that was the last action Blake Inglis had a hand in. Moments later he was leaving a trail of blood as he skated from the west end of the arena to the exit for repairs after being clipped across the eyebrow by Bill Serlie.

It was while Serlie was serving the five minute penalty that Raiders notched their next two goals. Gord Thompson from Galand and Blackie Graham made it 7-2 and Junior Beaumont fooled the Dundas net minder for the 5th time from Moe Galand.

He carried his party into the third period and opened a scoring in that frame by picking up his own rebound and drilling it into the short side. Galand and Graham were credited with assists. Dundas en-

ded their silence when Hales tallied from Reynolds and Constantine half way through the period. Galand had the honour of putting it into double figures when he potted Georgetown's tenth from his travelling companion, Moe Zubaluk, and from there it was a matter of coasting home. Dundas, however, were still battling and took advantage of the slack. Douglas from Walmes and Lauder scored right after Galand's marker, and hot on the heels of Douglas' goal was one by team-mate Blair. Constantine from Laufman and Knight at 17:20, the last.
