Stiff Wind Would Have Petrified Town

Georgetown and district life in the ice age briefly when the bottom dropped out of the thermometer in the last days of 1962 to set a modern day record in low temperature.

Sunday night the mercury dove to 22 degrees below zero freezing point in town and country thermometers registered even lower. The Herald's weatherwoman Mrs. Alicia F. C. Scott recorded a 20 below zero on the 31st, the lowest mark in 1962 and in fact recent years.

District correspondents agreed on the 22 below reading in the country.

Nobody needed a thermometer to know Jack Frost was getting around.

On the mornings of the 31st and Jan. 1st, cars that faced the weather unprotected by the luxury of garage could yield only a grunt when their optimistic owners turned the key. Service station operators said this by mid morning the list of motorists waiting for a push had become ridiculous. Some garages were telling callers they just couldn't handle the business. Others said they only listed the names of callers who needed their cars in an emergency.

By noon on Monday, the first day of the freeze up, one auto parts store operator had sold 40 motor heaters and was facing a bare shelf.

Almost as busy as the garage men were plumbers and heating men. People with outdoor oil storage tanks were particularly troubled. The cold temperatures created gobs of vaseline-like substances in the tanks and blocked the lines. Consequently people in many homes were without heat temporarily. The stop lights at the downtown four corners refused to operate under such severe conditions and were switched off towards a sensible temperature. Drivers stared at the lifeless traffic directors and wondered what they did before automation.

The Credit River froze to the bottom.

The works department received some calls to thaw stopped up pipes, but the weather moderated in time to save general water stoppage.

Had the cold spell been accompanied by a whipping wind it is probable that housewives on New Year's Day would have been preparing the traditional bird with a bioworth.
