Contract Soon for CNR Automatic Signalling

Now that work on the installation of automatic signalling devices at the CNR's Georgetown yard has progressed don schedule, the contract for automatic signalling between Milton and Hamilton will be awarded in the next few weeks it was announced this week by John Cann, project director of the Toronto terminal project.

Once this is done, contracts will be let for all 7.8 miles of automatic signalling needed for the 34 mile line from Dunbar to Malton and via Georgetown and Burlington, as well as in the township.

When completed, the yard will be about 3.2 miles long and a half a mile wide, not including the 6,000 foot pullback track at the north end. The 200 tracks will total more than 156 miles in length and have a standing capacity of 9757 cars. There will be 434 track switches, a freight shed, diesel shop, control towers, and various other buildings.

Winter weather has interrupted earth-moving operations on the project but bridge and building construction continues. Six bridges are under construction on the 34-mile access line to the CNR project, six buildings are going up in the yard and work is progressing on track laying and related jobs.

Stated for completion in early 1965, the freight classification yard will cover 1200 acres at Keele St. and Hwy. 7. It will handle 7000 cars per day.

Pouring Footings

Contractors are forming and pouring concrete for footings, abutments and piers for Little Rouge River, a subway in Markham township over the future extension of the Don Valley Parkway, to be known as Highway 404, and bridges in Eglwastoke to carry Hwy. 27, Albion Road and Indian Line Road over the access-line.

Concrete foundations for the 'master' and 'group' retarders are being poured. The retarders are designed to slow down cars moving through the yard so that they will couple gently to other cars in the classification track. Assembly of the retarders will be completed this winter.

By the end of 1962, more than 3,000,000 cubic yards of earth will have been moved on the access-line and more than 2,900,000 in the yard. However, some phases of construction have fallen behind schedule, owing to weather conditions.

Bridges at Henderson Ave., in Markham Township, and at Bathurst St., Dufferin St., 7th Line, Woodbridge Rd., West Don River and the CPR MacTear subdivision, all in Vaughan Township, have been completed except for final painting which will be done in the spring, Mr. Cann said.

New Overpasses

Into the 22 bridges under construction or completed along the access-line have gone 22,000 yards of concrete, 1100 tons of structural steel and 1300 tons of reinforced steel.

Tenders were opened Dec. 19 for new overpasses at Kennedy Rd., in Markham Township, and the new Airport Rd. crossing near Malton.

Tenders will be called in January for six more bridges, and for the remaining grading in Markham and Scarborough townships. Further bridge and grading contracts will be advertised during the winter for completion in 1963.

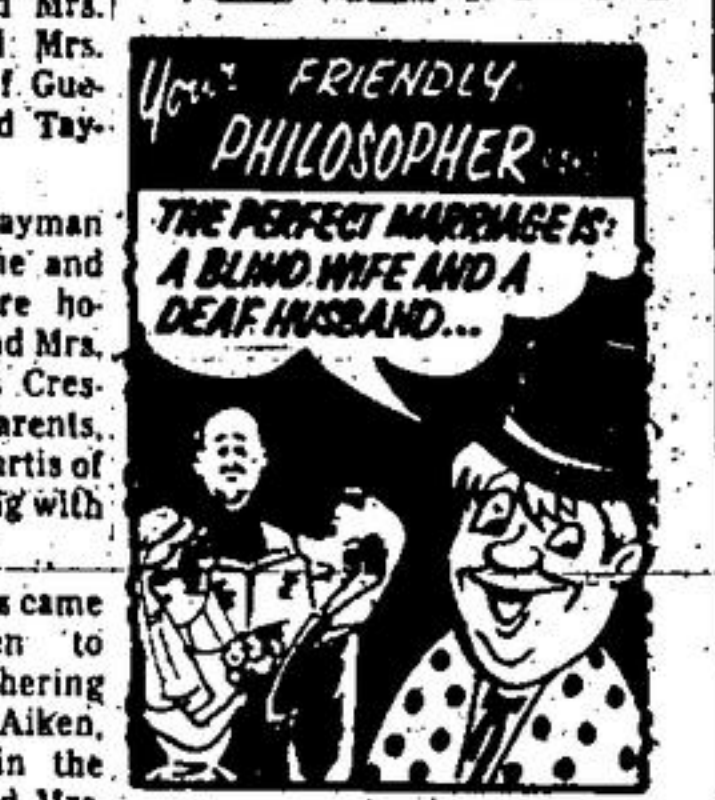
