Stewarttown's Year Was Sad and Happy Picture

Like any other community our little hamlet has what might be called the 'Highlights of the Year' at least they are happenings that affect the lives of the people living in and around the community.

We would like first of all to offer a tribute to those who have passed away this past year:

Mr. Wm. Sutherland, a very quiet but friendly man, whose home on the 7th line was a beauty spot — a garden of beautiful flowers was his hobby. Mr. Eric Wilson, a member of the Yellow Jackets motorcycle club was instantly killed in a motor accident. Eric, although not a resident here, was a member of the local church choir.

Mr. Ern Batkin, another accident victim, and well known to all of us through his work as secretary of the area school board.

The sudden death of Mr. Wilfrid Bird, county warden and township reeve, and road superintendent Wm. Townsend, friends to all of us through their township positions and Mr. Corey Herrington, a former Stewarttown resident, prominent as poultry judge and as editor of 'Feather Fancier'.

Two tragic fires left Thomas Aldwell and his family of the 6th line and James Brown of this village homeless.

Work on the CNR tracks has cut thru' many local properties. Sea gulls invaded the local pond.

An annual affair on Mothers' Day, the colourful parade — as members of the Yellow Jackets motorcycle club and their friends attended church service in St. John's Anglican Church.

In May, Mr. Jim Hamilton, 79 year old millwright, repaired for the 3rd time a cast iron gear at least 95 years old that helped provide water power for the Lawson feed mill.

He cut, trimmed, bevelled, shaved, planed and sanded down 40 new hard maple teeth to fit the ancient gear and with the assistance of Gordon Bridgen who welded the broken gear, had the mill back in operation in four days.

In September the feed mill, which had been in the Lawson family for 4 generations was sold to Master Feeds.

St. John's Anglican Church, after weathering many years, has the new look — white stucco and a new paint job.

Shelley St resident Sam Melzer has his brother Albert from London, England, as a guest this week. A book dealer, he is on a business trip to Canada and the United States.

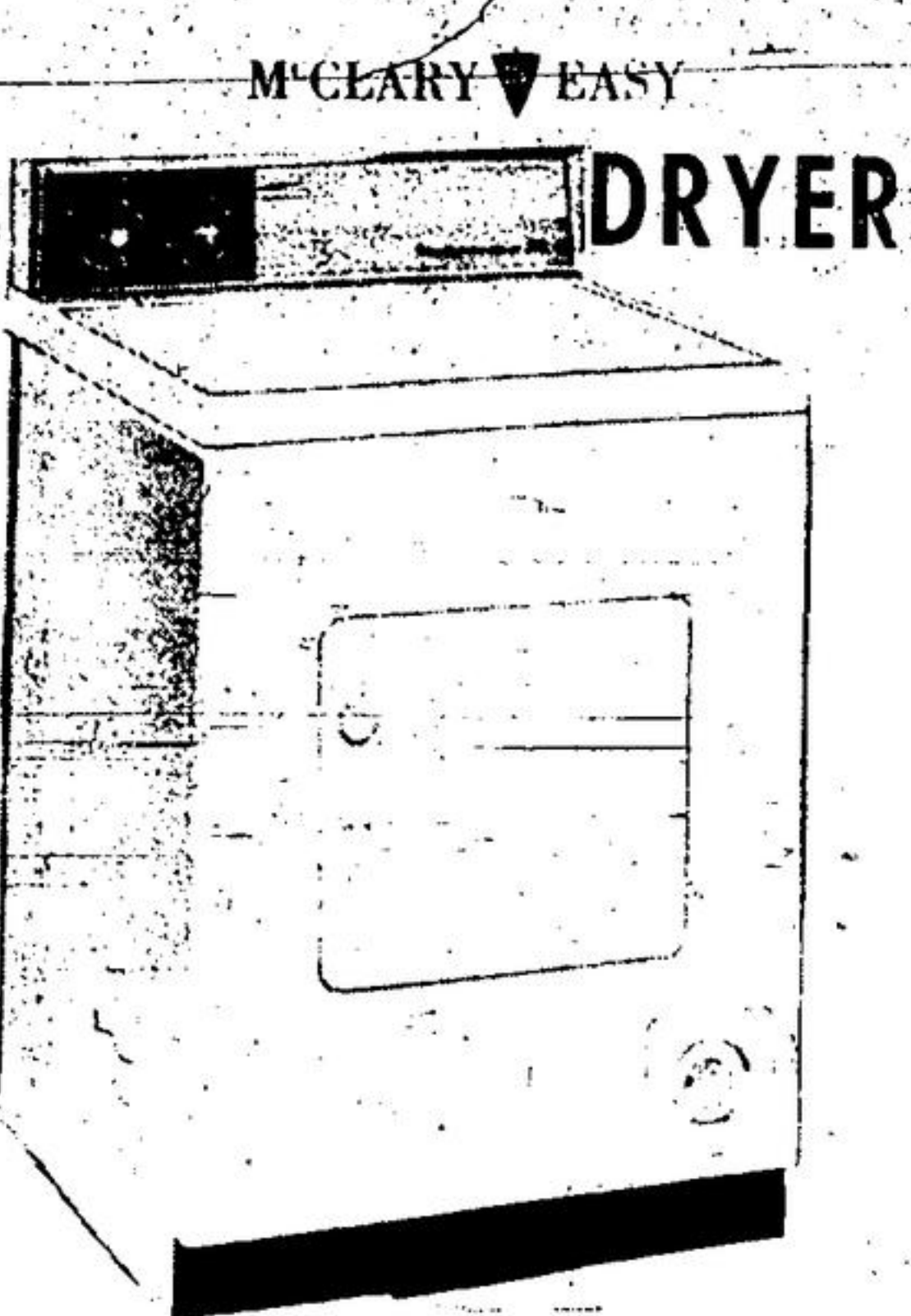

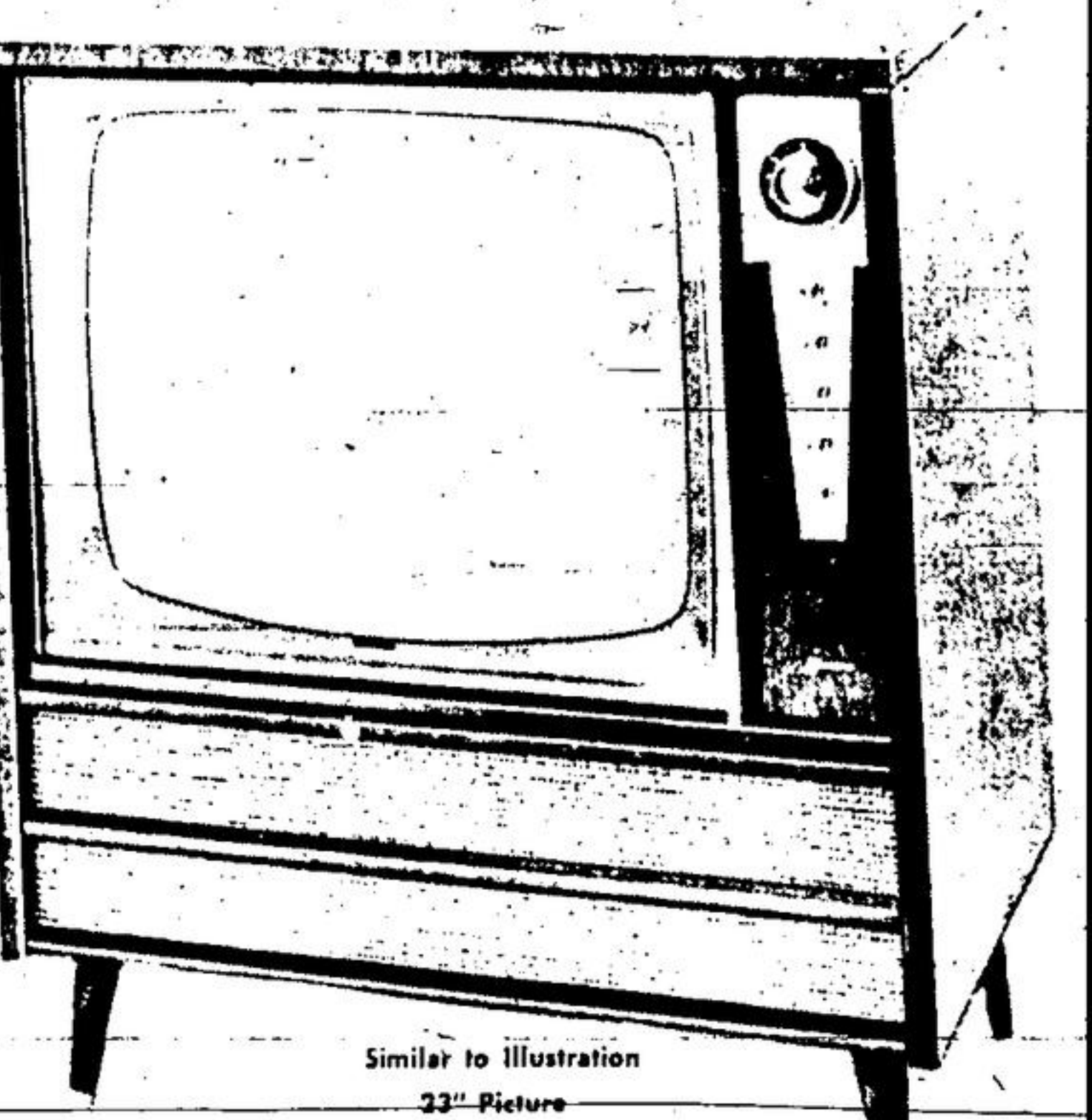
