To a nucleus that most clubs would be satisfied to go with unbelieved, the Oaks in their pre-season patching added a convoy of feared snipers, including Jack Price and Larry Shaker, Milton's twin goalie terrorizers and since then have lifted Andy Milne, formerly of the American hockey league, into a black and gold sweater. Jack Rogers, Bob Bishop and Bob McKay were holdover triggermen, who can turn goalies grey.

They were everybody's choice to slide into 1963 on the COHL shoulders. Right now they are nose and nose with Port Colborne for ownership of the league basement with 12 points.

Georgetown Raiders, the only other Halton county team in OHA Intermediate A hockey, pushed their cousins farther downstairs Friday with a 4-2 win here and looked full value for their triumph.

Break Up Pair

A Welland loss in Port Colborne would have put Raiders back into first place but the Sailors couldn't contain the league's hottest team, who protected their single point edge with an identical 4-2 victory.

Some of the Oaks' ailments were glaring Friday. The defense is not up to COHL standard and by juggling his players Ford has probably made the situation worse. To get some teeth into his blue-line crew, big Bill has broken up the Price - Shaker combo and converted Larry Shaker into a defensive role. Without his

Ragged Play
Play was ragged in both contests but Georgetown is expected to play better on their larger home court on the 10th. Each team plays a home and away game with each of the other teams in the league and the team standing first at the end of the short schedule plays off the titleholder of one other district to become eligible for the CWOSSA tournament at the OAC in Guelph.

Took the Cream
Both Milton teams lacked experience because graduation took the cream of their hockey crop, and while the replacements were eager their goals cost their team heavily. The first team Senators went to the final line 41 times but made good only 11, one of the reasons the coach felt more practice was needed before the Acton game. Their field goal average was nothing to write home about either. On 72 shots they sunk 22, about a 30 per cent average.

When the outcome was obvious, coach McLafren worked all 12 team members into the action and 11 of them got on the score sheet. Two rookies, Nurse and Harris, were high men with 8 points each. McLafren had 7 and Pennock and McNeil 8 each.

Top point man for the Juniors were Dave Brewster with 8, and Alan Peterson 8.
