

# Bill Ford Makes Changes Catch Raiders in Ambush

Oakville Oaks sprung an ambush on a bewildered Georgetown Raider club Sunday night and rode off into the night clutching two points, evidence of their sweet win over the team that has tripped them up on three previous occasions this campaign.

The ambush was organized by master schemer William Ford, portly and talkative coach of the black and gold who couldn't have caught the Raiders any more flat footed had he directed his crew to jump on the Raiders shoulders as they filed out of the dressing room under the end seats.

Raiders were looking for the same band of Ford followers that had handed over victories with little more than a protesting grunt they never found them.

Waiting for the Raiders with open arms, instead, was a hungry aggregation heavily laced with reinforcements and thoroughly juggled by large Wilkams.

Two and a half hours after touching, Oakville ice the Raiders were northbound on the 7th line still, feeling the sting of a 10-6 whipping.

**Work or, Else**

The new-look Oaks came about as the result of warning issued to his players, following their 7-4 defeat at the hands of Dundas Grallions a week ago Sunday. It was their tenth loss in 13 games. He told them then that anyone not pulling their weight in the Raider tilt would not suit up for the next one.

In preparation for the Raider invasion Ford picked up Doug Moore and unlined him on a line with Andy Milne and Jack Rogers. He then shifted Gus Karrys from his unaccustomed left wing spot back to his regular defense position. This made rearguard Jim Simpson expendable for a forward slot where he does the most good. The biggest increase in strength was on left wing of a line comprising Ford, Bishop and usually Jack Brown. But in this instance Wally Maxwell making his return after a year's absence from the fold. More bolstering was added to the blue-line brigade in the shape of Bruce (the Brusser) Brown.

**Things Happened**

Raiders, in the first twenty five minutes, looked like world beaters and until the new combinations began to mesh, early in the second period, it was obvious no ambush was going to keep Georgetown from chalking up a fourth consecutive win over their southern cousins. That was until little things started to happen. Little things like a sudden surge of power that pinned the red-shirts to their own back boards for minutes at a time. Little miscues like a stray pass that was pounced on by an eager Oak for a score. Newcomer Doug Orvis was not good, and Moe Galand, of all people, was consistently second best in battle for the puck. And when meticulous Nick Ferris makes mistakes it has to be an all night.

# Garbage, Dogs, Industry Occupy Council Attention

Council's opening business meeting Tuesday was mostly a routine matter of bank borrowing and appointments to various municipal boards.

Discussion touched briefly on three matters which occupied a share of attention last year: garbage, dog control and the industrial commission, but comment was brief.

Only actions to come from the three subjects was a decision to have the dog control officer, G. Robertson attend next week's meeting to discuss this phase of town services, when Mayor Hyde and C. Emmerson said they had received complaints from ratepayers about dogs running at large.

Deputy Reeve Wm. Hunter brought attention to the fact that there had twice been fires at the land-disposal site since the new contractor took over and said he was not interfering that the Rams firm is not doing a good job, but that this

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Mayor Hyde said it is economically impossible for garbage to be covered daily in winter.

Let's face it. We didn't do any better job ourselves when the town handled this several years ago," he said "but there is no reflection on the Council," he said "but there are other groups which think like to see a trial period of controlled daily burning."

"I'm opposed to burning - think it should be council's job to select the members."

Mayor Hyde said he thought the garbage question was magnified last year because of personalities and hopes that this won't happen next year.

The question was referred to the public works committee for study.

While no decision was made on composition of the 1963 industrial commission, opinion seemed to be that a smaller submission would be more efficient and Mayor Hyde favored our council selecting members rather than asking a referendum.

**DIDN'T REALIZE**

I don't think the Rams firm realized how much garbage there is to cover when they took the contract," he said. "I think the only satisfactory way is for the town to tender for collection and look after the landfill operation ourselves."
