Premier Among Dignitaries at Dinner
 Two honours in one day was the lot of Oakville lawyer John Dewey, Q.C., on Tuesday, January 8th when he was elected president of the Halton County Law Association and at night was the official host to the Premier of Ontario, John Robarts, at the Association dinner in Milton.

Among the guests were some of the foremost political and legal personalities in the province. In addition to the Premier, there were Attorney General Fred Cass, Chief Justice James C. McRuer, Chief Judge Arthur Wilson, and Joseph Sedgewick, Q.C., treasurer of the Law Society of Upper Canada.

Also on hand were Judge George Elliott of Milton, Magistrate Kenneth Langdon of Oakville, and Judges Alan Ambrose, Theo L. Combs, and Joseph Sweet of Wentworth County.

All members of Halton County Council, including the newly elected Warden, Dr. C. A. Martin were also present.

In his address, Premier Robarts called the new building the "court house", when he praised Halton County for providing such fine accommodation. Glances were exchanged since dissatisfaction has been expressed about the name "Halton County Administration Building." Some feel it should be known as Halton County court house.

The Premier said he had expected it completely during an earlier tour. He felt the building typified the growth of Ontario, which is resulting in not only the existing facilities for the administration of justice but also those for municipal services becoming inadequate.

Times Don't Change 1858 Report Shows

Chief Justice Opens New County Courthouse

"There is nothing new under the sun" was illustrated again when a 102 year old report, that of the 1858 grand jury, the first in Halton County, was presented to Chief Justice James C. McRuer at the opening of the first sittings in the new one million dollar County Administration Building January 8th. The report said almost exactly what every grand jury has been saying since then.

The grand jury of a century ago expressed concern at the increase in crime, and blamed liquor for the upsurge in crime. They recommended that municipalities limit the number of houses of public entertainment, and reduce the number of licensed shops selling liquor. Of interest to the taxpayer is the concern expressed over the rising taxes of that time.

Chief Justice McRuer complimented the municipal officials of Halton County for undertaking the construction of the new building, but suggested this the present sign, bearing the words "Halton County Administration Building" be joined by an additional pillar with the words "County of Halton Court House."

"As a symbol of law in this community it is very urgent that these words be there for people to see," he told the grand jury and members of the Halton County Law Association. The Chief Justice declared that the court is no part of the administration of Halton County. The function of the court is independent, not contented, and there must be no political strings, or influence on the court.

The question of the name of the building arose in December, when a county court grand jury asked that the building be called a "court house", but the request was rejected. The county council felt that Halton

the teachers and, even if they could, they could hardly be expected to report the misbehaviour that they are responsible for. The teachers are in the best position to notice the indications of delinquency, and they are not in a position to do too much about it except to draw it to the attention of their parents. If this information could be passed on to the proper authority at the time of its detection and remedial action were taken, a great many of the youngsters could undoubtedly be helped and I feel a stronger effort should be made to develop a liaison between the schools and the Juvenile and Family Court.

The Juvenile and Family Court is an institution functioning without much publicity, and every assistance from every level of government. The Juvenile and Family Court consists of a dedicated and competent Judiciary and it is with some (temerity that I make the following suggestions — it is motivated by the fact that this Institution controls the destiny of a large number of the people and, in most instances, is the Court of last resort.

Realizing the enormity of this responsibility, I suggest that more consideration should be given to the academic background and the training of those

Public Cooperation Was Help For Holiday Mails
 Post Office officials today doffed their caps towards the press and public for making possible what they described as "the biggest and best Christmas mail movement on record."

On the basis of preliminary figures from key major offices, postal authorities estimated that Christmas mail figures for 1962 were up from five to seven percent over last year's approximately 500-million items.

Most important statistic emerging from the Christmas rush was the fact that in all major offices, the peak working day was December 17th — the day the Post Office had set as a deadline for local mail delivery. On that day more than a million cards were cancelled at Ottawa, two and one-quarter million at Vancouver, nearly two million at Winnipeg and four million at Toronto. Montreal's 4,410,400 represented the biggest single day in the history of the office — Three-quarters of a million more than the biggest day of last year.

Commenting on the Christmas mail operation, W. H. Wilson, Deputy Postmaster General, said that early reports indicated that all major offices had cleared their Christmas mail by December 24th. He credited the press, radio and television for making known the need to mail early, and said that the Canadian public had responded to the Post Office's appeals for co-operation "better than ever before."

According to Mr. Wilson, the successful Christmas operation will be sweetened by a considerable saving over expenses incurred during the holiday season in 1961. Public co-operation, combined with improved mail-handling methods were responsible for the saving, Mr. Wilson said.

Post Office officials said that generally good weather across Canada during the days leading up to Christmas had helped the Post Office maintain mail schedules. Commenting on the weather, one senior post office official said, "we worked hard, had good co-operation, and we were lucky, too."
