Seek \$12,000 for Centre for Rabies

Halton County may get a \$12,000 isolation centre for animals suspected of having rabies. It would be the first institution of this kind in Ontario.
It has been announced that the Ontario Humane Society will ask the Ontario government this month for assistance in setting up the centre. Tom Hughes, the Society's general manager, has an appointment for Jan. 23 with Hon. W. A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture, to discuss the matter.
This action is being taken as a result of cases of rabies reported recently in the province, which amounted to 122 in December, the same as for the same month in 1961.

Five Prominent in Race Ontario P-C Nomination

The list of contenders for the Progressive Conservative nomination lengthened last week. The choice will be made in a convention January 25th at the Williams Ave. High School, Milton, when Fred M. Cass, recently appointed Attorney General will be the guest speaker.
A Roy Coulter, R R 3 Campbellville, and a Burlington resident announced last week he would seek the nomination. His announcement puts him in the running with Mac Sprowl of Esqueving who announced his decision earlier. Burlington lawyer George Kerr and former Burlington reeve Bill Hourigan have also indicated they will seek nomination. Glen H. Cooper, Oakville construction man announced that he was throwing his hat in the ring.
Not in Running
Dr. C. A. Martin, Milton reeve, this week denied he was seeking the nomination and stated he had no intention of standing for the office.
G. H. "Glen" Cooper, Oakville business man, and partner in the construction firm of Groothand and Cooper, has been active in Oakville and Halton County P-C circles. He has acted in the past as campaign manager for Sandy Best. He has been president of the Oakville Association and also the county association.
Mr. Cooper, who comes from an old Halton family, has been active in Oakville public life. He is a member of the Kiwanis and has been active in the Oakville Ratepayers Ass'n. He has an accounting background, and for many years was with the Dept. of Highways.
Mr. Coulter is presently the chairman of the producer-operated Ontario Wheat Marketing Board. He served for six years on the Burlington-Nelson District High School Board before amalgamation and since then has served two years as vice-chairman and two years as the chairman of Burlington Board of Education.
Mr. Coulter is also past chairman of the Halton 4H Club Leaders' Council, and the Canadian Red Poll Cattle Association. At present he is secretary of the National Federation of Agriculture.
He is presently serving on Esqueving School area board, has served on the executive of the United Church, and with his son, operates nearly 300 acres of farm as well as specializing in red poll cattle.

Kerr Candidate
George Kerr, whose candidacy was announced officially on Tuesday, owns his own law firm at Burlington. He is presently treasurer of the county organization, and is past secretary and a former ward chairman of the Burlington P/C organization.
Since coming to Burlington from a law practice in Hamilton in 1958, he has been vice-president and a director of the Burlington Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Kiwanis of Burlington and a member of the Burlington District Retarded Children's Association. He is a member of Burlington council, representing Ward 4. He, his wife and three children reside at 3041 Balmoral Ave., Burlington.

Hourigan Seeks Post
Lawyer and former Burlington reeve William E. Hourigan also announced he would contest the seat, Tuesday. He has practised in Burlington since 1953 and is a graduate of Central High School in Hamilton, the University of Toronto, Osgoode Hall.

Judge Interested In Langdon Ideas
"Very interesting" commented Mr. Justice J. C. McRuer, currently presiding at the winter sittings of the Ontario Supreme Court in Milton, when he was shown a copy of the reprint of articles by Halton County Juvenile and Family Court Judge K. M. Langdon.
The series of articles, dealing with delinquency and suggested methods of coping with the problem, first appeared in the Oakville Journal-Record, and is being reprinted in instalments in the Herald.

Mr. Justice McRuer reserved comment on the matter of the series beyond his general view that they were very interesting. "Seldom, if ever does one Canadian judge comment on the published views of a colleague."
Titled "Our Delinquent Society — A National Crisis" the series deals with family problems, preparation for marriage, broken homes, sterilization methods to cope with the crime of rape and the economics of marriage.

First Aid Course For Rural People

The Halton Farm Safety Council, in cooperation with St. John Ambulance, conducted the three-day course.
