P.S.I. Asks Council Support Local Selling

Extension of insurance coverage for doctors' bills, formerly obtainable only by business groups, is being made on a municipal level by Physicians Services Inc. A P.S.I. man, Mr. Lynch, told council Monday that after an experiment in a few towns and counties, his firm has taken Halton County as a group and hopes to sign a large percentage of residents in their plan.

P.S.I., he explained is a non-profit corporation sponsored by the Ontario Medical Association which pays all bills incurred by participating doctors who in turn agree to abide by fee schedules set up by P.S.I. He asked council to support the principle of community charge for a campaign which will begin in early February and continue for 8 weeks.

Mayor Hyde asked him to leave it a week for council decision. "I can see no reason why council would not look on it favourably," said the mayor. Quietly about how many county doctors subscribe to P.S.I. Mr. Lynch said he could not quote an absolute figure. "But if this way, there are only four doctors I know of who do not," he said.

Baha'is Protest Morocco Arrests

The Georgetown Baha'is at their meeting last Wednesday cabled King Hassan II of Morocco and wrote his Ambassador to Canada protesting the religious persecution of their fellow Baha'is in Morocco. There, 14 Baha'is were charged with working to overthrow the officially Muslim State of Morocco.

Ernest Barker, chairman of the Baha'is here, said that the trial, held in December, had been an inquisition and that the charges had not been substantiated since the defence lawyers, saying that the verdict was already prepared, had walked out of the court to the cheers of the spectators. "An appeal is being made," he continued, "against the sentences of death for three, life imprisonment for five and 15 years for one. The other five were acquitted."

"The Moroccan constitution" he explained, "guarantees religious freedom to all, and since all Baha'is must obey the laws of the government of the country they live in, representations have been made to the Canadian Government, the United Nations and President Kennedy by various Baha' bodies in order to bring this situation of extreme religious prejudice to the eyes of the world."

Representatives of a large industry were in town on Monday. Reeve John Elliott told council at their meeting that night that Mayor Hyde, Deputy Mayor Hunter and himself had spent most of the afternoon with the visitors. "We had a very favourable reception and I believe they will be back," added the mayor.

Area Residents Get Faster Mail Service

Dr. Harry C. Harley, M.P., for Halton, recently announced to the residents of Campbellville and Hornby that as a result of a request initiated to him by a resident of Campbellville that the situation of mail has been reviewed by the Post Office Department and it has been found that an improvement in service to Campbellville and Hornby is possible. The main volume of mail is received by Train No. 27 and the Highway Service and will be despatched when these are received instead of waiting for Train No. 21. This will allow earlier delivery in Campbellville and Hornby.

Hornby Such recommendations have been made to Ottawa by the District Director of Postal Service and only await official permission from Ottawa.

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
