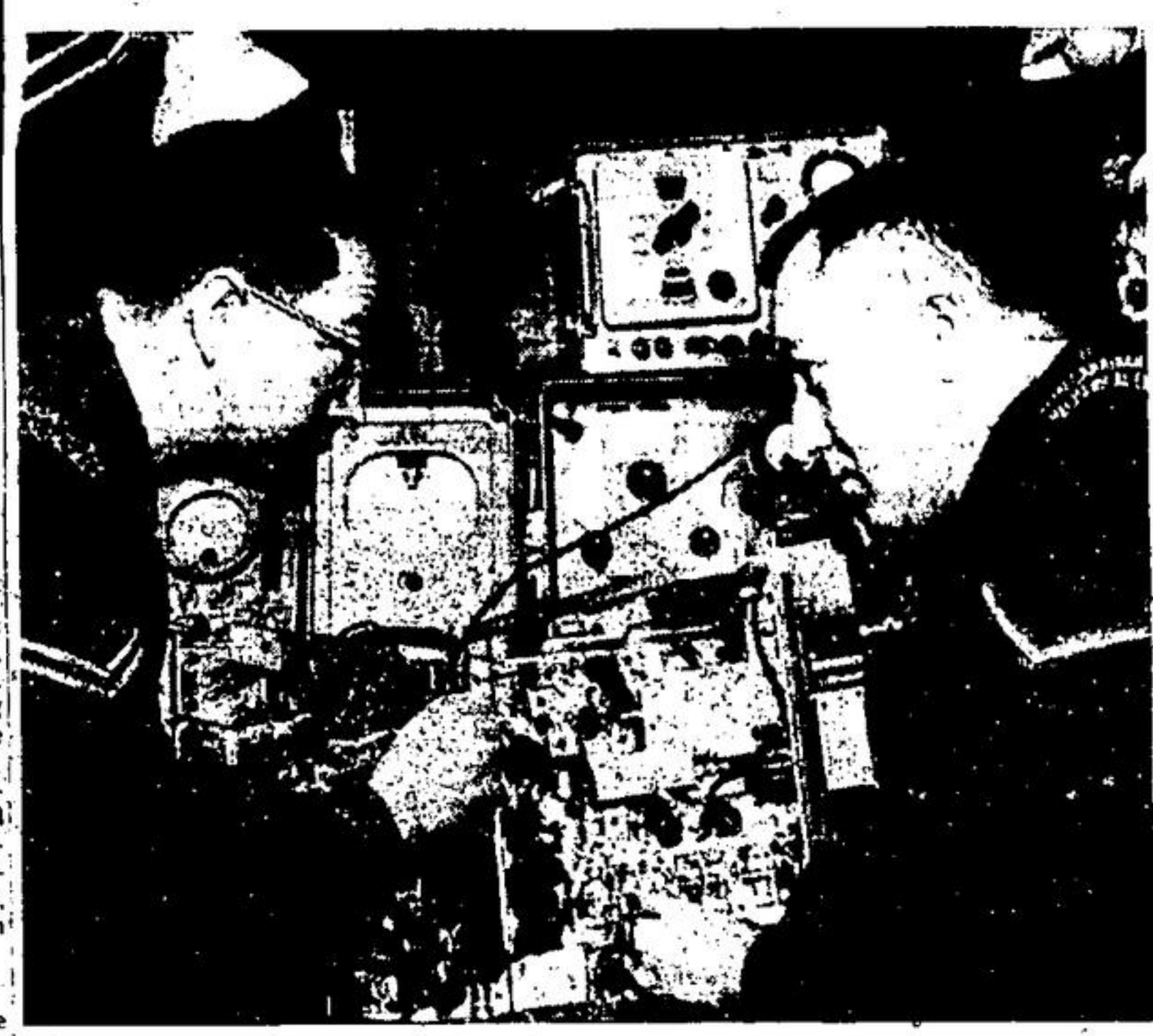

Terra Cotta Men Bag Timber Wolf

Two Terra Cotta men have bagged a 55 pound timber wolf, the sixth shot in Mono Township, just north of here, this winter.

Bob Elwood, 25, and Buck Sheppard, 22, dropped the animal on the east side of the township after a full day of tracking over snow covered fields.

"Toward the last the tracks were so fresh we knew we were close, so we looped around a concession in the car and blasted him when he was coming toward us," Elwood said. "We both had 12 gauge shotguns. I pumped three shots into him and Buck hit him four times before he fell."

Think Too Costly To Move Lighting

Three times during the afternoon faint tracks of a pack crossed the path we were following," Sheppard said.

Farmers in the vicinity had reported seeing a pack move across the countryside on Thursday.

First Had Rabies

The first of the 6 wolves shot this season was found later to have been in the first stage of Rabies infection.

Three years ago Elwood and Sheppard pursued up to track and shoot a wolf within a mile of their home in Terra Cotta.

"A wolf run seems to follow the escarpment which skirts Terra Cotta and Orangeville," Elwood said.

Ten Horses Die in Twin Lakes Fire

Ten horses, a dog and a cat died in a fire that destroyed a barn at the Twin Lakes property on the town line of Esqueping Township last week.

Firemen fought the blaze for nine hours. 18 volunteer firemen and two trucks were called to the barn at 9 p.m. "We fought it for three hours and thought we were getting the fire under control," Fire Chief A.E. Clement of Milton said. "Then it got away on us and the whole barn was lost. We did not seem to be able to get to the source of the fire mainly because of the hay."

The property is believed to belong to Mrs. Edith Baldwin, R.R. 1, Woodbridge and listed to Twin Lakes Resorts for a stable. The area is largely isolated. Mrs. Baldwin owns 200 acres. A further 600 acres in the area with no one living on it is owned by Consolidated Gravel.

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Men Wanted For Little Theatre

The Georgetown Little Theatre Group are sending out the word, "Men Wanted" Their duties to take roles in any upcoming production.

At the moment the group are reading plays, but most of them demand more men than the present membership. The possibility of having associate members, who would not be active, but could be called upon to fill the occasional part, was discussed at length last week at a business meeting.

The meeting closed after a debate on a question common to all such groups - the keeping of costs down to a minimum.

It is hoped the next production will be in March.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Appoint Nine Member Industrial Commission

A nine-member Industrial Commission was established Monday by council to serve the town in 1963.

Replacing last year's 14-man commission, the new group comprises five council members and four other appointees.

Bob Lane, who was a member last year, Murray Henley, David Capparaud and Ron Lytle are layman members of the commission. Council members are Mayor Hyde, Reeve Elliott, Deputy Reeve Hunter and C. Gray and Young. The reeve and deputy were also members of the 1962 commission.

Cr. Jim Young was empowered to set a date for the first meeting at which officers will be chosen and the new commission initiated.

This year's commission is a departure from last year when, after several weeks of discussion, council decided to ask recommendations from the Chamber of Commerce and Jaycees. It was late February before the commission was finalized.
