P.S.I. Now Available to All Halton County People

Comprehensive medical coverage, until now available only through group participation, is being extended by Physicians Services Incorporated to any Halton County resident who wishes to join.

On Monday, February 4th, the P.S.I.-sponsored Halton community health plan will open for enrollment. It provides full payment for part payments for all medical bills, from participating doctors who, in turn, agree to abide by the P.S.I. fee schedule.

**OPEN TO ALL** — The present plan allows all other residents to become members. In 1962 a P.S.I. campaign in which 75% of the residents of that town coverage. Offices will be located in Georgetown, Burlington and Oakville and enrollment without exclusions as to age or condition of health. Every effort will be made by P.S.I. representatives to see that all residents have an opportunity to participate.

As secretary treasurer, J. N. Bird presented the financial and auditors reports disclosing a balance on hand of \$60.84. The membership for the year had been 68.

With the consent of the meeting, J. N. Bird also supervised the election of officers for the coming year, which resulted as follows: President, H. J. Herder; 1st vice president, R. S. Barber; 2nd vice president, Mrs. W. Boyle; Directors (2 year) R. Williams, C. Walker, W. Ineson, E. Beasley and A. E. Taylor. Directors (1 yr.) Mrs. H. J. Herder, Mrs. P. Golden, Mrs. N. Devereaux, J. L. Colter and L. Giffan.

A. E. Taylor and Ben Cas were appointed as official delegates to the annual convention of the Ontario Horticultural Association in Toronto, March 21st and 22nd, with Mrs. H. J. Herder and Mrs. Wm. Boyle as alternates.

D. M. Wingo and L. B. King of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce were appointed as auditors for 1963.

Expect Opposition to Milton Annexation Bid

May is the earliest date a hearing can be arranged before the Ontario Municipal Board on Milton's application to annex parts of Oakville and Esquesing Township.

At last week's council meeting town solicitor K. Y. Dick was asked for a progress report on the annexation plans. "No date for our hearing has been set as yet and I know the board's schedule is full until May," Mr. Dick said. "The papers have gone out but I understand we will have a full-fledged fight on our hands."

"I never heard anything from Esquesing and have assumed all along they would oppose the application," Mr. Dick continued. "Oakville now seems to have changed its ideas and will also be opposing the plan."

Revert to Former System of Accounts

Council decided on Monday to revert to a former system of passing town accounts.

Last year, procedure was changed. A week prior to a meeting, committee chairmen were given a list of accounts in their department for checking.

Accounts were then passed in total at a council meeting with-out being read out in open council. Mayor Hyde said Monday that this is a disadvantage because all councillors should be concerned with all town purchases. A majority agreed and the old procedure will be used this year.

Victorian Nurses in North Halton?

At the inaugural meeting of the North Halton Urban Board Councillor J. Emmerson of Georgetown was elected chairman for the year and Jim Costigan, Milton town clerk, was reappointed secretary.

The possibility of introducing the Victoria Order of Nursing service came up again when a letter from Miss Catherine Mallford, Regional Director of VON, suggesting an extension of the Oakville branch to this area, was read. This extension, rather than a separate North Halton branch, would require only an extra part-time nurse in the Oakville branch.

Miss Mallford pointed out that the initial demand is not great. Eventually, when doctors and the public become more aware of the service, the Oakville branch would need a full-time nurse. This would add a cost of approximately \$5,000, which would be assessed against the towns on a population percentage basis, 21 per cent to Acton or \$1050, 52 per cent to Georgetown or \$2,600, and 27 per cent to Milton or \$1,350. These amounts would be decreased if Nassagaweya, and Esquesing townships were included. Part of these costs would be defrayed by patients' fees. In addition, a car would have to be provided. In many areas the service clubs provide the car, according to Miss Mallford.

At first, only 25 per cent of the amounts above would be required, with the understanding the rest would be available when needed. Councillor Norm Pearce, of Milton, felt there was a need for the service, but though it was difficult to pay it, "When it comes to proving it, people feel that they've managed up to now without it."

Already Provided — Coun. Wm. Hunter and Mayor E. Hyde of Georgetown wondered if this service was not already being provided by the county health unit. Mr. Pearce replied that the two services complement each other rather than conflict. "Oakville is quite a distance away," commented Mayor Hyde, "when we deal with the Oakville Humane Society, we donated money, but not little service."

It was decided to send copies of the letter to Esquesing and Nassagaweya Councils and have the Urban Board members discuss it with their own councils.

Many times councillors have felt they needed public relations men, but it was left to Councillor Charles Menzies of Milton to suggest it be made a committee of Council. Mr. Menzies envisaged public relations and personnel combined in one committee.

Coun. Wm. Hunter said a public relations committee of the Chamber of Commerce had been suggested in Georgetown, but it had bogged down somewhere.

Mr. Menzies felt it had to be a committee of council to ensure sustained interest.

Starting Salary — Coun. Les Duly of Acton asked the starting salaries of the other towns' work staffs. Since no one could remember exactly, it was agreed to have copies of Milton and Georgetown rates sent to Acton.

He explained that last year the Urban Board circulated a resolution to eighty municipalities asking for greater Dept. of Education support for the Schools for the Retarded. The resolution was almost unanimously endorsed. The Dept. of Education replied that they were already giving larger grants to the retarded than to the normal schools. Thereupon J. Addison was asked to provide the costs of educating the retarded child.

In the Milton area, Mr. Addison contended that it cost \$290 a year to educate the normal child, but \$527 to educate the retarded child. This is due mainly to the specialized attention and to transportation costs.

According to Mr. Addison's figures, the province grants \$117 of the \$290 for the normal child, and \$250 of the \$527 for the retarded. In the first case, \$173 is left to be covered by municipal taxes, while in the second \$277 is left to be raised by the municipality and public donations.

However, donations raise \$170 of it and municipalities only raise \$99. No decision was reached on any further action.
