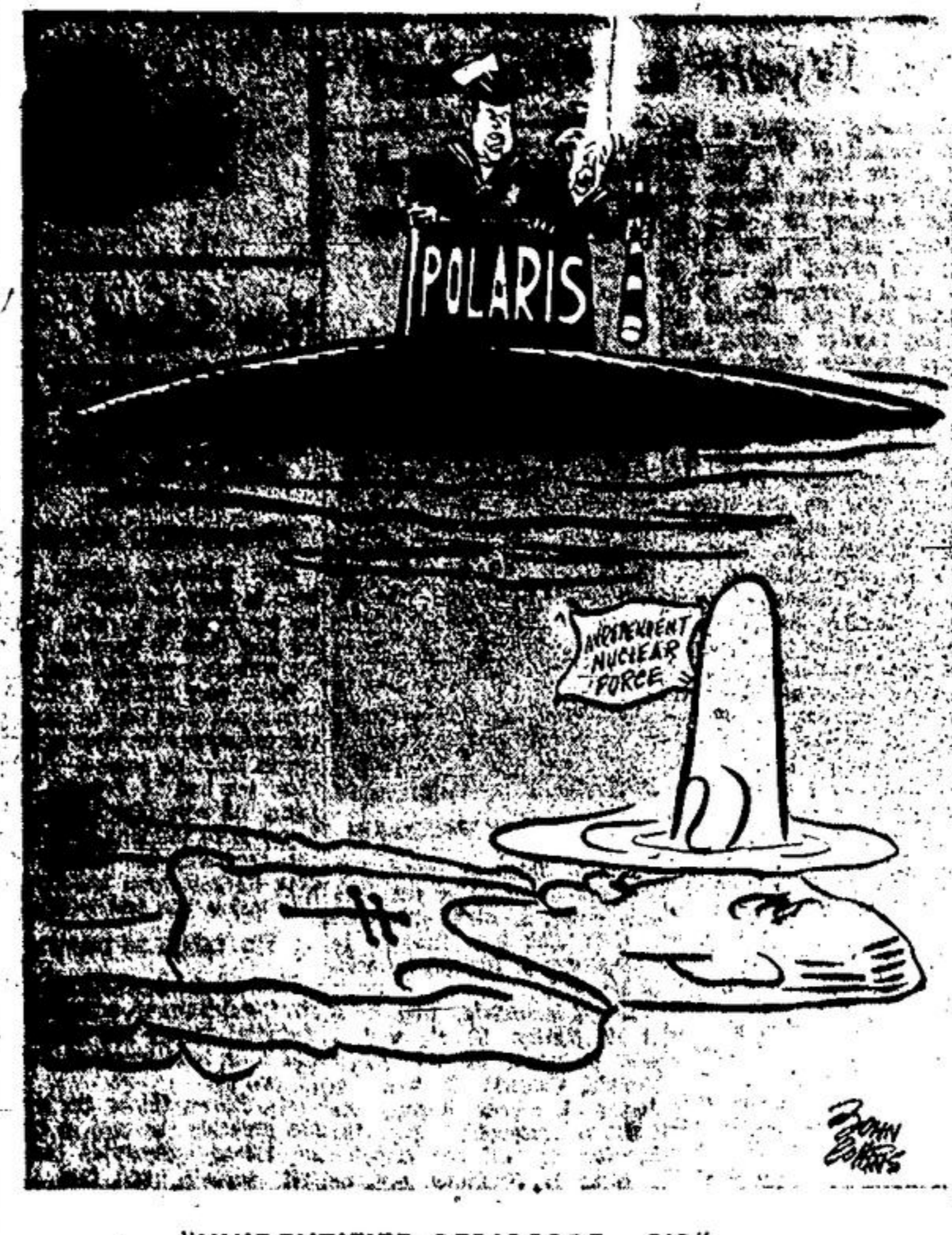
practice of allowing any person the floor to ask questions of comment on town affairs.

A board of education, which would administer affairs of both public and high schools would, we feel, be an added advantage today.

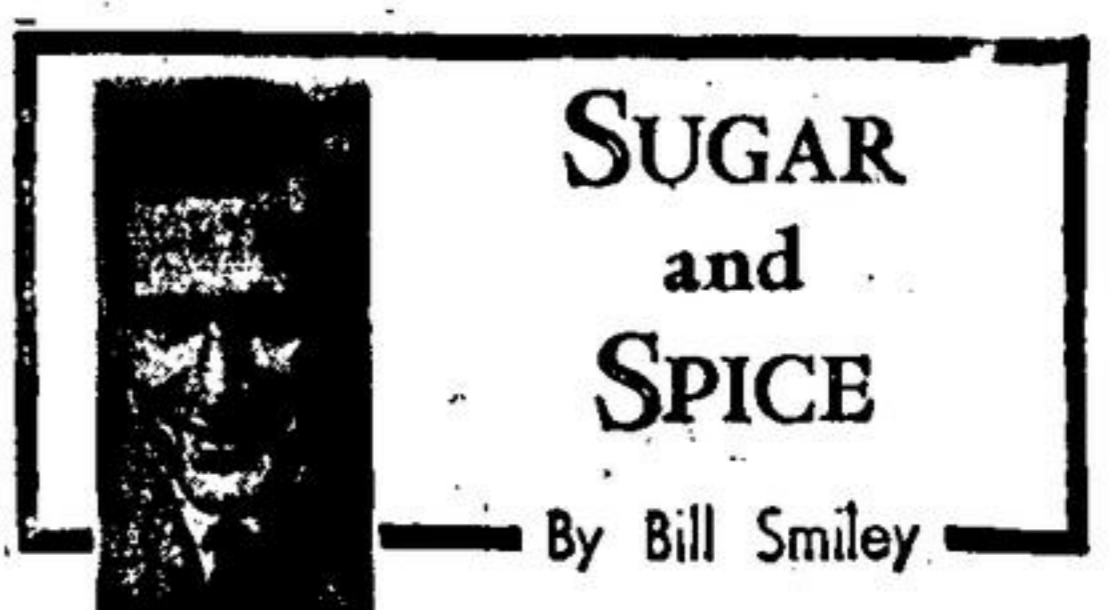
Georgetown had such a short-lived group several years ago, which was disbanded after a year's service when Georgetown was pushed into an abortive three-town high school area.

Legion Imperials Elect New Officers

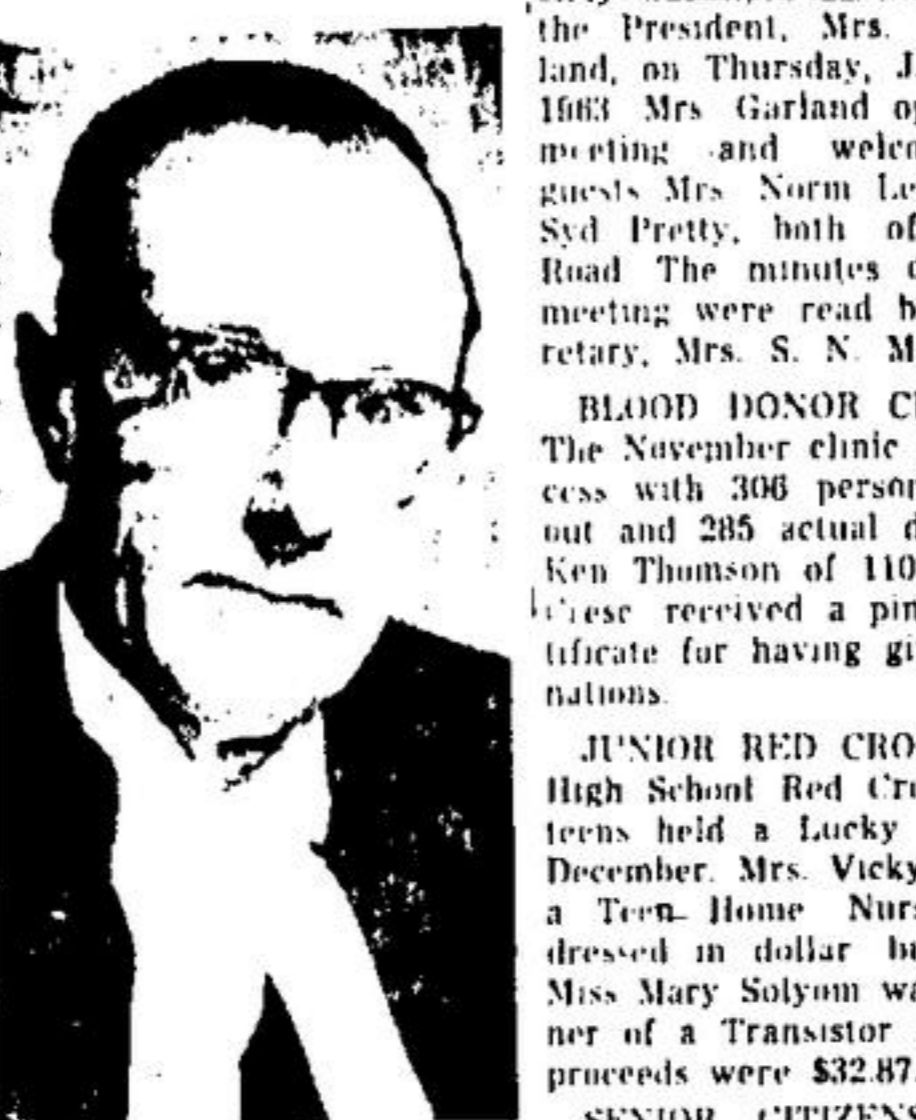
The Imperials Section of Branch 120, Royal Canadian Legion, held their election of officers for 1963 on Sunday, Jan. 20th, with the following results:
