Schools Getting Together

Attempt at a liason between elementary and high school teachers is to be commended and should play an important part in future education in Georgetown.

Recently teachers from Grade 7 and 8 met with the high school staff and decided to form a coordinating committee. Both groups, it is felt, will be better equipped to assist parents and students in choosing the most suitable courses, through this mutual exchange of information and ideas.

Creation of a full vocational and technical course at the local high school has made it urgent for parents to be fully aware of the path their youngster will follow as early as possible.

Originally, with only an academic course, there was little thoice and it was possble to delay a career decision until the later high school years. Now only Grade 9 is allowed for this choice, and a course once chosen in Grade 10 has limiting factors which can affect the whole future of a young person.

the new rule does not prohibit this, of course; for it merely calls for a formal notrice of intent prior to the meeting, and an indication of the subject to be discussed. But it will tend to limit the number of speakers at a meeting for some will not take this extra trouble, particularly when their appearance is in the heat of the moment.

In coming years it will become increasingly important for elementary as well as high school teachers to be informed of the education avenues and to be in a position to give counsel to young men and women.

A board of education, which would administer affairs of both public and high schools would, we feel, be an added advantage today.

Georgetown had such a short-lived group several years ago, which was disbanded after a year's service when Georgetown was pushed into an abortive threetown high school area. Separate boards were fine in the days when there was a sharp separation between public and high schools and only a small percentage of students continued on to Grade 9. Today when there is a mass trend to higher education, separation of school boards seems ungecessary.

Commend Busineeswomen

The careers preview offered to high school girls last week through the Business & Professional Women's Club is something which we hope will become a yearly event at the high school.

Guidance, as we have said above, is becoming increasingly important, and bring-Ing working personnel to the school to tell girls what their jobs entail is an excellent adjunct to the work of the staff advisors.

The preview should have far-reaching effects on the girls who heard the lectures and who were afterwards given the opporfunity to question speakers about a variety of positions for which they can train.


