Receive Approval For New Co-Op Medical Plan

The Halton Co-operative Medical Services this week received approval from the Ontario Department of Insurance to proceed with their plans to offer a comprehensive medical care coverage to members and prospective members effective March 1st, 1963. The Medical Co-operative, in business since June 1st, 1947, when it was granted a charter to provide pre-paid hospital insurance, has been giving surgical coverage since 1952, more recently added a major medical plan which covers a portion of the expenses excluded from the surgical contract. It will now be able to offer a complete coverage. Self-employed people and small businesses have found it difficult to obtain this type of protection but will now be able to get it at a cost below other available insurance plans.

Close-to-home administration gives the member the advantage of being able to discuss many of his health problems on a strict confidential basis; co-operative principles allow the member to have a voice in how the savings are used and he receives an audited financial report each year as well as being able to elect the directors of his choice.

The Halton group is a member of the Co-operative Medical Services Federation of Ontario, which includes 32 counties in its membership, and keeps the member counsels posted on recent developments of medical health benefits. The administration works closely with the directors in providing the best available health care under the schedule of fees of the Ontario Medical Association.

Since 1958-59 when the Ontario Hospital Services Commission took over all hospital insurance business, the Halton Co-operative Medical Services group was retained as a collecting agency for their hospital insurance premiums. For this the medical co-op receives no remuneration except the satisfaction of providing a much needed service for its members.
