At left Mrs. White and the 'shoulder wheel unit' help Mrs. Gladys Lounds recover the strength in her wrist after an elbow fracture. Mrs. White, who joined the staff in September, from the Ontario Hospital in New Toronto, now treats an average of fifteen patients per day in her department, helping them to regain the use of weakened limbs or awaken dormant muscles. All treatments are prescribed by a physician.

No Official Candidates Yet for Ont. Liberals

With the provincial Liberals in Halton it's a case of not knowing which comes first — the chicken or the egg. Mayor Owen Mullin of Burlington, widely mentioned as a probable candidate for nomination as the Liberal choice in Halton, said on Friday he had not made up his mind whether to enter the nomination contest and wanted to wait until a nomination meeting date is set before he makes a decision.

Several other prominent Liberals' names are mentioned unofficially as possible candidates. And that's just the trouble. It's all very unofficial.

None Came Forward "How can we set a date for a nomination meeting," asked Perry W. Nelson of Oakville, president of the Halton Liberal Association, "when no one has come forward and announced an official candidacy?" No one is more anxious than Mr. Nelson to get the Liberal ball rolling, but he sees no point in setting a date with a blank slate of potential candidates. Candidates first and of G. Miller, the president, My liberal candidates at that, says Miller, opened the meeting by Mr. Nelson. But Mr. Mullin, reading the 24th Psalm follow for one, wants to wait for a convention date.

Asked if the division of up-walkead hasse might be a factor in candidates' reticence in announcing their plans, Mr. Nelson thought not. "That issue cuts across party lines," he commented, "and I don't think it is an issue that would deter a candidate's official announcement at the provincial level in any case."

So it's anyone's guess at the moment whether the candidate's announcement will come first, or whether party officials will have to eventually take a chance and set a date.
