Raiders Take a Beating Despite Goalie Cameron

While Moe Galand sat at his bunk in a Toronto fire station with his fingers crossed to put a hex on anyone foolish enough to play with matches on such a night, his Georgetown Raider mates were being singed by a fiery aggregation from Welland in Georgetown arena.

The Welland Merchants showed the crowd of 600 the best defense to play in the hockey house this season and enough offense to thump Raiders 3-1. The loss left Raiders with a 500 batting average on the season, 10 wins and 10 losses, a record, belittled by everybody but the fowly Fort-Eries.

One month ago the Raiders had a win-loss record of 7 and 3, and were breezing along far out in front of their league mates. Right now, three other teams, Oakville, Pt. Colborne and Welland are in front of them - and another, Dundas, is tied in pits with a game in hand.

NO CHANGE

Galand's presence might have made it more respectable but it wouldn't have changed the outcome. Welland on Friday, January 18th weren't about to be beaten.

Spearheaded by their poker-faced captain, Bill Ewer, the Merchants backchecked vigorously and never allowed their red-shirted opponents a chance to get organized. Raider passes invariably ended up on Merchant sticks, especially inside the Georgetown blue line where Raiders had their troubles shaking the pesky Welland forwards once they did get possession. But for all the alert hockey produced by Ewer and company it was a Raider who emerged from the debacle shining like a new dollar. J. D. Cameron had enough rubber thrown at him to exhaust a plantation. The way he handled most of it made him a shoe-in for all three star selections and a couple of honorary mentions.

Relegated to second netminder behind Barry Smith when Smith played just too well to be alternated, J. D. (which incidentally must stand for Jumping Dynamite) made stops that were practically impossible, recovered in the same motion and took the second shot full on his pads.

But Cameron's thievish, frustrating as it was to Merchant triggermen, failed to break their will, and they kept coming in like a rising tide. Some of the thwarted snipers were so irked at being denied they continued into the net after shooting and took eager chops at the leather basket Cameron finally raised the redhead's ire and he discarded the mitts in the third period to go after one tormentor with his stinging knuckles clenched in ham-like fists.
