

# BPW Bring Five Speakers to High School to Outline Careers Available

Careers Preview, a program to bring to the attention of High School girls the many careers open to women in several fields was sponsored by the Business and Professional Women's Club at the High School last Thursday afternoon. Three hundred and twenty five girls from Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 attended the session which was made possible by the cooperation of principal and the guidance counsellor.

Principal J. L. Lambert welcomed the speakers and commended the club for its interest in the high school girls, prior to introducing the president Miss Jean Mackenzie. Miss Mackenzie explained very briefly why the club was doing this work, to improve the status of women, and it was felt that starting at high school was the proper place. She introduced Mr. A. Prouse, guidance counsellor, of the school who introduced the five speakers of the afternoon.

Mr. J. M. Broughton, sales representative for the Steel Company of Canada, was the first speaker whose talk dealt with what was required in the realm of office work. He stressed the fact that to succeed beyond the ordinary routine worker you needed intelligence, efficiency, loyalty, enthusiasm, and many more attributes than just plain book-learning.

The personnel supervisor of Trans Canada Airlines was the next speaker and he spoke of the various occupations within the airline, stewardesses, tele-

types operators, switchboard passenger agents, and comparatively new positions, at the airports, as ground hostesses, at the airports, for which a girl must be bilingual at least.

Mr. C. C. Loyst, employment manager of the T. Eaton Company stated that 80 per cent of the T. Eaton Co. employees were women, and here they had opportunities to follow many careers, retailing, merchandising, fashion, beauty culture, interior decorating, dieticians and grammar, a sense of curiosity, imagination, zeal and persistence.

Work and careers open on newspapers and magazines were discussed by Miss Jessie London, associate editor of Chatelaine Magazine. She talked of the various careers open in that field such as journalism, art, advertising, fashion and beauty, and home economics. Good grammar, a sense of curiosity, imagination, zeal and persistence were x-ray technology and dieticians.
