There will be 363 babies born in the Georgetown Hospital in 1963. That was the prediction made just prior to the end of the year for budget purposes. The estimate for 1962 was 364. During the past year there were 364 babies born in the hospital and 163 boys outnumbered the girls by just 10.

Other statistics that came out of the Friday session revealed that there were 2,068 adults and children in and out of the hospital during 1962. The average newborn stayed 8.1 days. There was no real peak season observed although there were more beds occupied during September and October than at any other time. Never occupied to capacity the hospital has been filled to 82% of the occupancy. The daily average is 49%.

There are 74 beds and 16 bassinets in the hospital and 112 full time employees, 26 of which are nurses. There were 805 surgical operations in 1962, 632 of which were minor and 173 major. There were 2,710 emergency visits. The patients were served 70,377 meals which cost \$25,637.00. The total cost for running the hospital was \$507,589.00 and of that \$351,977 went for salaries.

Treasurer Continues Handle Welfare Post

Praying the job Mr. McBride has done, Mayor Hyde said "a staggering amount" was paid by the town in 1962 for welfare.

"I won't quote a figure until the auditor's report is prepared," he said, "but I can tell you that in the last two or three months the amount has dropped to 10% of what it was a year ago."

He said the town had lost a large portion of an \$800,000 government grant because proper procedures had not been carried out in the past.

Some 250 attended the convention which was addressed by the Minister of Education, the Hon. William Davis; Dr. Z. W. Phinister, Director of Education for Toronto and Dr. G. Flower of the Ontario College of Education.

Workshops and seminars dealt with the federal and provincial sales tax problems, the Ontario municipal employees' retirement system, accounting and purchasing, maintenance, secretarial practice, cafeteria benefits, professional development courses and transportation.
