Ace Bailey, Laura Treble NOVICES SPLIT PAIR IN MILTON HOCKEY GAME

The men's and ladies' All-Star championship qualifying round for the Eastern-Canadian championship were completed at Georgetown Bowl on January 20th and it will be Ace Bailey and Laura Treble carrying the local hopes. There were 33 contestants in the men's division competing for the eight bowlers selected to represent Georgetown in the area finals on Feb. 17. In the women's division there were eleven competing for the two bowlers qualifying to proceed to the area finals.

In the men's division the competition was tough and the top bowlers were not decided until the last game. Ace Bailey grabbed the lead after the first two games bowling scores of 301, 273 for a total of 576. He was closely followed by George Barber with games of 328, 228 for a total of 556. 3rd to 8th spots were held respectively by Lou Brandford 511, Jack Timpson 507, Frank Ferguson 505, George Nurse 501, George Farrow, 494, Tom Graham 486 and Harry Brandford 483.

Hung On
After the 4th game Ace Bailey still hung onto the lead with 1094 having added a 102 in the 4th game. George Nurse took over second spot with 1045 and Lou Brandford climbed to third with 1026. 4th and 5th spots were held by George Barber, 898 and Jack Margaret Sayers, Timpson 892. Roy Robinson Jean Graham broke into the running for the first time having bowled a 318 in the 4th game giving him a total of 966. 7th and 8th spots were held by George Farrow 945 and Tom Graham 942. Bob Gourle 921 and Frank Ferguson 921 having dropped 1100 to 5th to 10th spot were pushing the leaders.

Ace Bailey proved he was the class of the tournament rolling 233 in the last game, maintaining his first place position, and winning the Georgetown Men's All Star championship qualifying round with a 5 game total of 1227. Ace Bailey and his wife bowl on the Married Couples league Tuesday nights. At present he is holding a 229 average.

Barber Runner Up
Ace also has a 981 3 game total in his credit this year. Pinnerup was George Barber with a 5 game total of 1275. 3rd to 7th spot was held by George Nurse 1263, Lou Brandford 1298, Tom Graham 1194, Jack Timpson 1188, Roy Robinson 1187. The eight qualifying spot was decided on the last game when Bob Gourle bowled 238 to Tom Graham's 207 giving Bob a five game score of 1162 and a 13 pin edge over Tom's 5 game score of 1140.

In the women's division Laura Treble won the Georgetown's Ladies All Star championships qualifying round with a five game total of 1114. Laura Treble is the president of the Ladies Afternoon Bowling League at the Georgetown Bowl. Her present average is 191 and she holds the high single with a 191. Al Blair from brother Jim. Ron fine 353 game.

Sylvia Dutar was runner up with a 5 game total of 1044. Sylvia Dutar pulled close to goal. There were eleven penalties in the 4th game when Laura Treble had an 876 total and hung 7 to Preston's four.
