

# Odd Goal, Untimely Penalty Jinx Raiders

An odd goal and an untimely penalty broke Raiders morale Friday night and they had to swallow their fifth straight loss, this time at the hands of the Fort Erie Autos who have gleaned about half of their point total from Raider encounters. In five meetings it was the fourth Fort Erie triumph.

The peculiar goal came late in the third period after Georgetown had finally paid off with the tying goal to make it 2-1. Hall took a pass just inside the Raider blue line on a return rush and J.D. Cameron appeared to have the angle blocked. But instead of a clean shot, Hall got away a slow slider that caught Cameron off balance and hit the far corner behind the Norval Redwood. This is the breaker of all goals that have been over the way Raiders were outplaying the Forts, but chances for a second rally went out the window when Gord Thompson picked up a foolish penalty with three minutes to go.

When Thompson returned to the ice, coach Scotty Patterson replaced Cameron with a sixth attacker but Chesney intercepted a pass at centre and beat Gord Thompson who had dropped back to cover the empty net. The final was 4-2.

### Galand Frustrated

If there was an award for the most frustrated player it would have to go to Joe Galand. The league's leading scorer on three breakaway attempts and had at least half a dozen other scoring chances that went for nothing. He wasn't alone. Other Raiders had labelled the shoots picked off by Fort Erie's diminutive goalie, Zimmerman, who was a one-man barrier.

## Georgetown Leading in Minor Playoffs

Territorially Georgetown owned a big margin, but Zimmerman and erratic shooting kept them from cashing in. In fact, Fort Erie built a 2-0 lead in the first half of the game while being outshouted. The first period was scoreless but wasn't without a momentous occasion — Joe Galand drew a penalty — and that is an occasion. It was his first of the season and came at 12:30 when he matched elbows with Rouse who also was given a two minute sentence.

Junior Beaumont had a great scoring opportunity in the first minute of play and Galand was stymied twice. J. D. Cameron robbed Fort Erie of a goal when he stopped Chesney on a breakaway. Hall had a chance to score on the rebound but Cameron's recovery was too fast.

### On the Ropes

The first goal was early in the second period. Malinkovich went around Gerry Inglis and Doug Richardson, cut in front of Cameron and backhanded it over the shoulder of the Georgetown goalie who had gone to his knees. Raiders had the Autos on the ropes and apparently powerless when Reid broke out and rushed; end to end to notch Fort Erie's second goal. Cameron's view was blocked by players at the edge of his crease, and he had gone low for a look when the puck cleared his right shoulder.

Georgetown's first counter was a perfect deflection by Doug Richardson. Gord Thompson did the work on this one and rifled a low shot that would have missed the net if Richardson hadn't dropped his stick at the right time. The puck went over Zimmerman's skate. The game threatened to erupt into a donnybrook early in the third period as tempers took over Malinkovich went after a fan in the southeast corner and drew a fighting major and a ten minute misconduct. 


