

Extra Chlorine Dose Purifies Town Water

Residents who have noted more chlorine in their tea should be glad, said Mayor Hyde on Monday. It has not been generally known, but for some time town water has had an adverse bacteria count... sufficient for an epidemic of almost anything as the mayor put it. But he hastened to add that residents can now breathe easy.

Pollution came from the old Silvercreek reservoir which was draining into the water supply. The town has now, on advice from the OWRG, sealed off the inlet and master chairman Don Powers told council that chlorine content has been increased for a week or two. When miller weather comes, water lines will be flushed.

It can't occur again, the mayor assured residents, as only water from deep wells will be used in future.

Halton Member Gives Notice of Vacancy

Ottawa (Special to the Herald) — Official notification of the vacancy created in the House of Commons by the appointment of Hon. Earl Rowe as lieutenant governor of Ontario, was made in the Commons Tuesday by Dr. Harry Harley, MP for Halton.

Mr. Harley notified Speaker Marcel Lambert that he was giving notice under a section of the House of Commons Act that a vacancy has occurred in the representation for the electoral district of Dufferin-Simcoe.

Found Irregularities

Under the rules, such notice must be given to the Speaker, who, in turn notifies the chief electoral officer. Six months from such notification the government must announce the date of a by-election to fill the vacancy. In November, similar notice was given for St. John's, Newfoundland, and found irregularities with the service vote in the June election.

Starts the Machinery

Outside the House, Dr. Harley said he had been asked to make the announcement Tuesday because his riding of Halton is adjacent to Mr. Rowe's riding of Dufferin-Simcoe.

"The notice starts the machinery in motion which will eventually force the government's hand in calling a by-election," Dr. Harley explained. "However, I am still of the opinion that a general election will intervene to eliminate the necessity of by-elections in either Dufferin-Simcoe or St. John's."
