# Says Daylight County Aspirants

Cr Jim Emmerson told council Monday he feels strongly about a new decision of county council to hold all committee meetings during the day instead of even-

ings as formerly. "Discrimination" he charged, saying that many men could not serve on the council because of this.

Deputy Reave Hunter explained trouble had been encountered because municipal councils met on Monday and Tuesday nights, and this left only two week nights for county operations.

"I'm inclined to agree with Cr Emmerson, but you know my opinion of county councils" said Mayor Hyde, who has been quoted as say. ing they should be abolished. 'However the county has made its decision and we're not in a position to pressure our local representatives,"

Cr Emmerson said he would bring it up for discussion at the next North Halton Urban Board meet-

Differing opinions about whether the garbage contracfor is to cover only household garbage under his contract or must cover industrial waste dumped by private contractors at the landfill site led the council Monday to delay voting on a motion.

The Hildebrandt - Emmerson motion would impose charges of 50c to \$2.00 per load on such industrial disposal.

Cr. Powers protested any charge to Smith & Stone which, trucks its own waste, saying It does not need covering and, in fact, can be helpful to the contractor.
