Operation Snowflake County EMO Project

Halton County Emergency Measures Organization is participating in an 8-county communications exercise believed to be one of the largest of its kind.

The Feb. 13th exercise, called Snowflake 1, will be triggered when Orangeville area is hit by a mock ice storm. It will see Halton's EMO swing into action along with communications volunteers from Peel, Dufferin, Waterloo, Wellington, Ontario, and York and Simcoe counties.

"To my knowledge, this is the first time a communications exercise has been done on such a scale in Ontario with civilians," said Peel's EO co-ordinator, Major Jack Adams. "Of course it has been done many times by the Army," he added.

"Snowflake One is actually a trial run for a second communications exercise stated for some time in March. "Snowflake Two is a surprise exercise that will be sprung on the 8-county volunteers without a moment's warning," said Major Adams.

All land-line communications such as the telephone will be hypothetically wiped out by a violent ice storm. Cars with mobile radio erquipment will be despatched to key points to create an emergency radio hook-up runring into the storm-swept ar-

The mock ravages of nature will have created the need for emergency medical and food supplies as well as emergency mobile generators where hypothetical power failures are threatening hospitals and homes for the aged in Dufferin. The needs will be ordered over the emergency network but not actually delivered.

The Snowflake exercise will be kicked off by Brampton's CHIC radio at 7.20 a.m., Feb. 13th, when it carries Major Adams' appeal for EMO communications volunteers. The radio station carries a daily broadcast at that time with public information on EMO.


