Minor Ball Given Preference
Look Down at Intermediates

The thought these days among members of the Halton County Baseball Association is to forge ahead with minor ball and let the intermediates take care of themselves.

Saturday afternoon in Milton the association held its annual meeting, and at this gathering minor baseball received a shot in the arm when the association had its executive raised from four to eight men, the additional four coming from the minors, headed by a minor league chairman.

Until Saturday's meeting, the carry the same power as Oakville, a town which has been most of the balls and strikes, in the association for many years. It was also suggested that the intermediates form their own group and minors' their Milton, and Dave Andrews of Brampton were named to the executive.

Len Andrews, representing Campbellsville, felt "intermediate clubs have a big budget of \$500 to \$1500 a year. The minors don't have to sell the game, and therefore they work on a smaller budget as much of their financial backing comes from the tax dollar."

Raiders Still on Skids
Take Thumping by Oaks

Georgetown Raiders have reached the 'let's make some changes' point.

Coach Scotly Patterson started a series of experiments in an attempt to find what's ailing his charges Friday night by removing himself from the bench and turning the reins over to someone player, sometime spectator, Blackie Graham.

Oakville Oaks thumped the Red Shirts 7-1 in registering their 10th consecutive win, while Georgetown absorbed their 7th straight defeat. They passed each other on the COHL ladder a couple of weeks ago, heading in opposite directions.

The change in bench generals is Patterson's first step in his personal "total commission" in the rise and fall of a puck-slinging hockey team. If other games with Graham at the Raider helm have the identical result Coach Patterson will re-assess control of the team and start looking for other rocks.
