Halton's New Democratic Party will nominate provincial and federal candidates on February 28th in Oakville.
 But Carl Rouleau, Streetsville high school teacher, will not seek a second try for the federal seat in April.
 Mr. Rouleau in a statement released yesterday to the press said that last year's campaign had been "a strain on my health, my work at school and my finances."
 "This does not mean a complete withdrawal from active political life but merely a reduction of my participation for the present," he said. "The New Democratic Party is strong enough in Halton to obtain good candidates without being dependent on a single individual."
 Only man in the field to date is Thomas Hubs, Oakville, who will seek nomination as a provincial candidate.
 Mr. Hubs, 35, was born in Kirkland Lake and is employed as chief purse by TCA at Milton. He is a former president of Canadian Airlines Flight Attendants' Union. With his wife and three children he lives at 1237 Thornhill Drive, Oakville.

Parliamentary Procedure Is Studied by Jaycees

When Leo Podetz visited the local Jaycees as guest speaker at their dinner meeting last Wednesday he proved to be versatile.
 For not only did he make his scheduled address on the aims of Junior Chamber work, but he did double duty and subbed for a scheduled speaker on parliamentary procedure who cancelled out at the last minute.
 The Hamilton man was well qualified for both speeches. He is vice president of the Ontario Jaycees and has had wide experience in Chamber work at the local and national level.
 No Open Sesame
 "Membership in the Jaycees is no open sesame to success," he warned local members. "The club does nothing for you unless you devote your energy and time to being an active member."

 "For those who participate in Jaycee work, self-assurance, broader outlook on community and business matters, acceptance of responsibility and the ability to better express one's thoughts are the rewards," he said.

 Later, Mr. Podetz outlined some of the rules of parliamentary procedure. Members were then divided into groups and carried on mythical meetings, making motions and discussing subjects, while he provided criticism and help.
