

# Harley Sees Grit Win Best Sees Tory Chance

Halton County politicians Carl Rouleau said another election at this time was regrettable. He predicted it would solve nothing and there was a strong possibility the country would land up in another period of inaction with a splinter parliament.

"I can't say whether I would run again. I do have it under consideration, that's all."

He said he expected an election would be fought on the defence policy issue and he was firmly for NDP Leader Tommy Douglas's stand on nuclear arms.

**Nuclear Arms Now**

Harley said the Liberal party was for Canada fulfilling its current commitments which calls for nuclear arms. He added that the Liberal party wanted to review the whole matter of Canada's economic and political problems.

"But the PC's or NDP's may have other ideas. If they choose to make issues out of nuclear arms, or anti-Americanism, the Liberals will have no choice but to reply," he declared.

Sandy Best defeated PC candidate Irving Wilson. He was doubtful whether he would run in a new election, but he said the party would definitely offer a candidate unless the Canadian people are so indecisive, assuming their leaders, they will realize it is time for a change," he declared.

He predicted the Tories would make gains.

**Setting Sites**

The officers of the Lorne Scots will not say if they are setting their sights on high but whoever makes the presentation the occasion will be notable for the regiment and the three counties of Halton, Peel and Dufferin from which its members are drawn.

The tempo of training for the presentation will quicken as the date draws closer but at present the training is more routine and more practical.

First comes the recruit training. This is followed by a course in national survival and rescue training, which, if passed satisfactorily can lead to recommendation for training towards promotion as non-commissioned officers and possibly later as an officer in the regiment.

**Many Are Students**

The regiment draws a large part of its recruits from students in the higher grades of high school. It is proud of the fact that an average of one year from these students pass on for further training at Royal Military College.

Usually by that time they are fully fledged corporals and sometimes sergeants in the regiment.

The Lorne Scots has been in existence since 1936 when it was formed through a merger of the old Lorne Rifles, later the Halton Rifles and the Peel and Dufferin Regiment. After the merger the colours of the old regiments were laid up. The new colours will have ten battle honours, some of them bequeathed by its predecessors.

**The battle honours include:** Ypres, 1915, Somme, 1916, Hill 70, Hindenburg Line, Sicily, Aras, Amiens, Italy, Mount Sorel and the Pursuit to Mons.

In addition to the honours in Georgetown the regiment has its headquarters in the Brampton Armoury and three other armories at Milton, Oakville and Lakeshore.
