

Study Park Location In East Georgetown

Initial study is being given by council to establishing a second municipal park which would particularly serve residents in the newer eastern part of Georgetown.

A Hildebrandt-Smith motion in council Monday was endorsed, to discuss purchase of a suitable site from Delrex Developments Ltd.

"No one will disagree that we need another park in this area," said Cr. Hildebrandt and the first step is to talk with the owner of vacant property and try to arrive at a price."

A Necessity

"A definite necessity," Cr. Smith termed the park. The new councillor campaigned in December on a program of improved recreation facilities for the town.

Local Firemen Help Battle Milton Blaze

Georgetown's Fire Department was thrown into action early Tuesday morning when the Milton brigade summoned help from Halton County Mutual Aid in battling a \$150,000 blaze that ravaged the historic 'Old Mills' in the county town. As well as standing time, the old stone walls of the three storey building withstood the blaze and only the shell was left standing.

Electrical motors, grinding equipment, belt, the old water wheel, the slate roof and an estimated 200 tons of ground feed and alfalfa were either ruined or badly damaged in the 6:10 a.m. fire.

A total of fifty firemen from Milton, Georgetown and Acton rushed to the scene. Const. J. Pickett of Milton police force discovered flames pouring out of the south east corner and turned in the alarm.

"I couldn't say how much it 'is worth' said Wallace Kennedy, general manager, but he declared that the damage would be assayed immediately and as soon as possible Robin Hood Flour Mills, the owners, would set to restoring the wooden interior and equipment.

The fire was brought under control in about two hours but firemen continued to pour water for several hours more on smouldering grain and alfalfa. The Milton fire chief said he had no idea how the fire started in the ancient building and refused to speculate on whether it might have been spontaneous combustion in the grain or a defect in electrical equipment.

In a recent centennial publication describing the town the mill was featured as its oldest landmark. It played a big part in the early life there. Established in 1822 by Jasper Martin it is said to be the reason for the 'mill town' that sprung up around it as settlers gathered from miles around, both this century and last, to have their wheat ground into flour.
