

## CENTRE OF CONTROVERSY .....



THIS IS THE SILVERCREEK RESERVOIR

**BLEAK GREY WALLS** and large slab of foot-thick ice which collapsed when the water was set out, are all that remain at the Silver Creek reservoir three miles north of town, the current centre of a controversy about water pollution. The grey line in the background is the top of an east wall. In the middle of the picture a staff reporter checks the exposed screen-box and pipe.

**THE MOUTH OF THE PIPE** which leads into the town's water supply sits well above the floor of the reservoir. It is normally covered by a screen box which is tilted back here for the picture. Springs still flow into the reservoir from pipes. In the walls, but the water finds its way to the drain pipe near the base of this outlet, and is directed into a stream.
