THE MOUTH OF THE PIPE which leads into the town's water supply sits well above the floor of the reservoir. It is normally covered by a screen box which is tilted back here for the picture. Springs still flow into the reservoir from pipes in the walls, but the water finds its way to the drain pipe near the base of this outlet, and is directed into a stream.
