A last warning to delinquent texpayers was sounded Monday when Mayor Hyde said registered letters will be sent within the next three weeks, informing delinquents that their properties have been registered.

Once this is done, an owner has a year to redeem his property by paying all back and current taxes and expenses of the registration. The mayor warned that the procedure is carried out by the Dept. of Municipal Affairs and is out of council's hands once action is taken

The rule applies to improved property on which taxes are owing for three years, and on two years taxes for unimproved property.
