**Estimate \$100,000 Cost Halton Winter Roads**

By the time the last snow and ice of this winter have vanished under the attacks of salt, sand, spring sun and showers they will probably cost the people of Halton close to \$100,000. Removal of snow and ice from roads is a costly operation, and this figure is just about the normal annual expenditure.

Oakville roads superintendent ton county road superintendent Jack Orr and his work crew have been busy plowing snow-covered roads and applying liberal quantities of sand mixed with salt to rid the surface of ice which endangers traffic.

**Sand and Salt**

"We have a lot more sand and salt on the roads so far this winter," said Mr. Orr. "It would amount to about 7,000 or 8,000 tons, he estimated, which is 2,000 tons more than at this time last year. The proportion of salt used is one to ten of sand."

Dennis Cairns, purchasing agent, said that 8,000 tons of the sand and salt mixture would cost about \$10,750, not including the expense of putting it on the roads. The budget for snow removal in 1962 was \$15,000, and for salt and sand, \$25,000. This is about what it cost Oakville to keep its roads free of snow and ice during a normal winter.

"We are using about the same amount of salt and sand this year as last, in the usual manner," said Roy F. Smith, Hal-
